MANY THANKS to all the kind members who have contributed so generously to our Cattery Appeal. As well, even more thanks for all the additional donations to help offset our welfare running costs. Our fund raising to date has exceeded our expectations and most of the thanks go to you, our very supportive members.

Since our last journal there have been some changes to our welfare staff. We lost the services of our CEO, Kathryn Williams, who is now working for Delta, an organisation that provides people in nursing homes and institutions with the joy and company that cats and dogs can bring. With Kathryn's enthusiasm and promotional skills, we know that she will derive much satisfaction and rewards from her new role.

Sue Matysek took over as Office Co-Ordinator. She has proven her ability by handling the office very competently during a bad period of staff illness and she is a many talented lady with a calm and pleasant manner, liked and respected by her colleagues.

Our previously all female staff has now been joined by a young man, Sean Anderson, who has adapted quickly to his new occupation and is carrying out his tasks with skill and compassion. We call Sean the 'gentle giant' as one of his interests is body building. Judith Levitt was hired as Sue's assistant and with her aptitude and friendly disposition, we consider ourselves very fortunate with our new roster of office staff.

Companion Animals Act. At the time of writing this Act is being debated in Parliament. Because of poor drafting, certain clauses have led to many protests from within the Parties, from animal welfare organisations and from the public. Therefore, it is taking longer than expected for the Act to be passed. In the meantime, the adverse publicity is giving the impression to the public that the Act is already law, resulting in more owners than usual handing in their cats to us. Unfortunately, we believe this trend will continue, for awhile at least.

Naturally, more work and pressure is being put on our welfare service and we will be appealing to the Government to recompense us for the additional staff and other overheads that will be needed if this Bill is passed.

Can you help by spreading the word to people that they should wait to see what happens before they make drastic decisions to give away their cats because they think cat ownership will be too hard. After all, the Act is supposed to protect cats and we should give the politicians another chance to get it right. SHIRLEY PIKLER



You may be surprised to see a new face in the photo. In my new role as Office Coordinator, I hope I am able to give you a small taste of office life for us who work for your Cat Protection Society. involve you in the type of issues we work with on a daily basis, from the workings of our welfare team (the integral core of our operations!) to our lobbying in Parliament. To this end, we also need feedback. We often receive wonderful notes of thanks from our members which certainly lift our spirits when we're dealing with tough issues. But if we are not dealing with the type of issues you would like to see us involved in, please let us know!

After a really hectic summer breeding season we are overjoyed to finally slip into the cooler months where we can again find homes for every healthy kitten that is handed to us. At this time, also due to the vastly diminished numbers of kits we are pleased that more buyers are considering our mature cats. It's a great feeling for us when we are able to rehome an adult cat that has lost its kitten appeal. Many of these cats that are brought to us as abandoned or unwanted strays seem to project so much simple trust in us as human beings and in our ability to protect them, that it is sometimes heartrendering.

I'm sure most of you would have taken great interest in the controversy that has been raging in the media regarding the new Companion Animals Bill. The office has been inundated with calls from concerned members and the public asking for our opinion on the legislation. At the time of writing, we are all waiting with bated breath as to whether this Bill will be passed in the Upper House and with what amendments. Cats are now the focus - for the first time.

Most humane thinking people were outraged at the inclusion of a clause in the Bill which stated that any person can injure or destroy a cat that is harming any person or animal or causing damage to property. Pressure applied from concerned animal welfare groups and the ensuing media debate has resulted in the wording of this controversial clause being amended.

Unfortunately the negative media attention which has been focussed on this Clause (although appropriately so) has obscured some of the more positive sides to this Bill. If this Bill is passed, at long last our cats will receive the same status as dogs within the community.

We advocate compulsory microchipping and registration since this will greatly improve our chances of reuniting lost cats with their owners. Microchipping is particularly important for cats since collars and tags alone are not permanent. Unfortunately we would dearly love to see compulsory microchipping and registration apply to all currently owned cats, not just to newly owned felines obtained after the Bill's inception. This type of 'halfhearted' legislation will only result in ongoing problems with identification of cats for years to come. We would rather endorse a phasing in period similar to that which will apply for dogs so that over a few short years all cats will ultimately be protected.


We have long argued the necessity for compulsory desexing (and now microchipping) of all companion cats (except those used in registered breeding). Unfortunately this Bill does not provide for compulsory desexing. However, there will be a price difference on registration

depending on whether the cat is desexed or not which, apart from all the other benefits, will make ownership of a desexed cat even more attractive.

Another clause which has caused some concern is the one pertaining to nuisance cats. This certainly does not mean that if your cat goes to sit in the sun on your neighbour's property that you will be fined. Nuisance cats would generally apply to those cats that repeatedly make a lot of noise during the mating season, ie, undesexed cats, or those that are repeatedly attacking your cat, causing it injury. Nuisance cats will have to be determined by an authorised officer and a fine may apply as a maximum penalty.


If this legislation is passed it will help us protect our cats by providing the framework for sensible legislation that will assist responsible cat owners and their cats in becoming 'good citizens'. Cats are not currently covered by any legislation which means that responsible cat owners are disadvantaged and the converse often applies to irresponsible owners. Having to pay extra for services that are not compulsory, like microchipping, disadvantages responsible cat owners. Our cats are disadvantaged by not being protected by any law.

What has been of real concern is the onesided attitude that certain members of the media have taken, thinking, no doubt, that they have the best interests of our companion animals and particularly cats, at heart. Let us not let the media distort the real need out there for good workable legislation. Our cats need this Bill for their protection and we need it too as responsible pet owners.

A LOST CAT 🏚 A HAPPY ENDING

The telephone call was a fairly routine one — were we prepared to desex a female cat, get her clipped and have a vet look at her skin? She was a Persian with a fairly matted coat and a few skin lesions where a collar had been caught under her foreleg. After a call to our vet who does discounted desexings, I was able to tell the caller that we would be happy to do it.

Gemma brought in the cat as she had promised, a very thin black Persian with the most beautiful golden eyes and a very sore looking patch under one foreleg. I was gingerly placing her in a carry cage when Gemma told me her neighbour in Ultimo had been feeding the cat for a couple of weeks and she, herself, had taken over the cat's care just recently. It was then Gemma decided the cat needed to be desexed.

I scanned the Persian but there was no microchip. I reached for the Lost Cat Register and started flicking through the pages in the forlorn hope that someone had rung in with a similar description. Eureka!! A desexed male black Persian in good condition and wearing a leopard print collar had been lost in Ultimo. A quick check confirmed the cat was a male, definitely not in good condition - but hardly surprising since he had been missing over a month, and no collar. Gemma said that an unelasticised collar had been removed by the neighbour who found the cat. A call to the neighbour and then the suspense of waiting until the neighbour found the collar and phoned back. It was a leopard skin print. Things were starting to look up. The clincher was when I rang the very excited owner who told me the cat's name was Midnight, Middy for short. When I said his name the cat suddenly looked straight at me with those gorgeous golden eyes and emitted a hopeful miaow. I told the owner I almost certainly had her cat but what was he doing wandering the streets of Ultimo when his owner lived in Maroubra?

The story unfolded when his owners came to claim him. His very curious nature was nearly his downfall - he had leapt into the back of a refrigerated truck at 3.30 am, which then travelled to Ultimo. When the back door was opened the terrified cat leapt out and ran off down the still dark streets. Despite a lengthy search no trace of the cat was found and considering his name, this was not surprising. His grieving owners put food out every night hoping he would emerge. Thankfully, he found his way to Gemma who brought him to us and helped us reunite one very relieved cat with his very relieved owners.

As a teacher of French, I like my cats to have names that can be pronounced with ease by anglophone and francophone friends. Both cats answer to any tone of voice that implies food and affection. They like to keep a distance from one another but do go to sleep in the same chair. Belle is the boss but there are times when Rose gets fed up, turns the tables and gives chase.

We all visited the vet not long after they arrived in order to identify a lump in front of Belle's left back haunch. I was relieved of money and worry by the diagnosis of a lump of fat! So far my neighbours have ignored their presence except for the woman who has volunteered to feed them on the occasions that I am away overnight. These cats have not replaced the cat that I lost: they are part of a line of cats with whom I share my life. Their former owner must be very sad to have lost them. They are obviously

and,


when you lick my bare skin, I know, That,

I will miss your love and companionship terribly.



CAT GOT THE SNUIFFLES ???

TRY ACUPUNCTURE

Since the 1970s, acupuncture has been increasingly used as an adjunct to conventional western techniques of human medicine. Similarly, acupuncture techniques are now available to veterinarians for the treatment of a variety of ailments in animals of all shapes and sizes. I've now been using acupuncture for almost half of the twenty years that I've been a veterinarian. In my case, it is a complement to my more conventional practice rather than a replacement for the usual day-to-day veterinary procedures.

When I first started using acupuncture in my practice, I utilised it mainly as a treatment for musculoskeletal and spinal conditions slipped disks, arthritis, sore muscles and the like. As I became more familiar with the results I could expect from acupuncture, I began to use it for a range of other conditions, often with remarkable success in problems which are otherwise very recalcitrant to conventional treatments. One of these conditions is chronic feline rhinitis/sinusitis complex - or the "snuffles" as it is known to all cat owners and breeders.

The snuffly cat is renowned among veterinarians as being a tough patient to treat. Often what we are presented with is just a cat who, since having a bout of the flu as a kitten, is prone to frequent respiratory infections. There are some individuals however who, if they are not on medication such as antibiotics and decongestants almost continually, are in a state of perpetual misery, with sneezing, runny nose, lack of appetite and what looks for all the world like a giant headache. Apart from the inconvenience to the owner of having to give medication continually, there is a very strong risk in these cats of developing bacterial resistance because of the long term use of antibiotics.

Such a pussy cat in my own practice is 'Victoria', a tortoiseshell moggy who is now 11 years old. Victoria had had a fairly uneventful medical history, and had been routinely given her annual vaccinations against enteritis, flu and leukaemia. In January 1996 Victoria presented to us with a 4 month history of coughing once every few days. In the 3 or 4 days prior to her coming to see us on this occasion, the cough had become much more severe and she had also started sneezing. Her nose was blocked up, her lymph nodes were enlarged and she looked generally stuffed up and miserable. She also had a heart murmur, so in view of her age we ran some tests on her. Her blood count was normal, she showed no sign or heartworm, she was not hyperthyroid and her chest x-rays showed nothing other than slight heart enlargement and minor lung congestion. She was put on a course of antibiotics and decongestants, and also some long term medication for her heart.

Initially she showed a response to the medication, but in April she

was at the surgery again. Despite being on the heart medication, she had continued to have severe sneezing, congestion and also occasional coughing; she again went onto antibiotics and decongestants. These would be only moderately effective, and as soon as the drugs were withdrawn she would redevelop severe signs. Between May 1996 and February 1997 she had no fewer than 14 courses of antibiotics, but the severe symptoms would return again and again.

At the end of February, we tried acupuncture for the first time. When she came into the surgery she was extremely snuffly and blocked up, with a very profuse nasal discharge. In all, Victoria had acupuncture treatments on February 26, March 8, March 14 and March 21. She showed little change after the first treatment, but after the second she had begun to improve and was virtually normal after the third. Victoria returned to being a happy, normal cat with no respiratory problems whatever and she regained the friskiness she had exhibited as a kitten, Her owners were delighted, simply describing the results as "a miracle'. At the time of writing, it is 14 months since Victoria's course of acupuncture and, to date, she has shown absolutely no signs of the snuffles recurring, It is doubtful that we will get any recurrence in future, but if there is one, I'm quite confident that acupuncture will get things under control again.

So just what is this miracle treatment? Acupuncture is the insertion of fine needles into specific points of the body to result in specific physiological effects; sometimes the needles themselves are replaced by stimulation with heat or another form of energy such as a laser. It began to be practised in China around 4000 to 5000 years ago. There are a total of 365 acupuncture points which are on the surface of the body and are available to be treated; each one has a specific and defined function, depending on the response of the body.

Western science has established that acupuncture has an effect both on the body's bio-electric current and on its release of the body's natural pain controllers, endorphins. Probably a combination of the two are involved in acupuncture's effects.

The Chinese explanation of the way that acupuncture works involves the concept of Qi (pronounced 'chee'), or energy that flows through the body in channels called meridians. Disease is a result of an imbalance in this system, and the insertion of needles at special locations along the meridians restores balance. The utilisation of acupuncture involves a wholistic approach to medicine; the concept of balance and harmony is all-important. One of the major benefits of acupuncture is its safety. It is free from the side-effects of drugs. It is a 'gentle' therapy, aiming at the establishment of homeostasis or balance in the system.

I usually perform acupuncture without anaesthesia or tranquilisation, and on an outpatient basis to that the owner can remain with the animal throughout. The treatment regime varies with the nature of the problem being addressed, but typically a course might consist of three or four treatments at intervals of a week. Each treatment lasts for between 10 and 30 minutes. There is no undue discomfort or pain when the needles are inserted. Often there is a powerful calming effect and feeling of well-being about 10 minutes after the needles are in place, due to the release of natural endorphins in the body.

I've found acupuncture to be a tremendous additional tool in fighting injury and disease in both dogs and cats, and there have been innumerable cases where it has achieved cures in what have otherwise appeared to be hopeless cases.

Not all animals and not all conditions are suitable for treatment with acupuncture. It should be administered after a proper diagnosis has been made, and with a proper knowledge of anatomy. For this reason I believe it is important that animal acupuncture be performed by veterinarians who have been trained in acupuncture techniques. There are now around 140 veterinarians in Australia who have been certificated by the International Veterinary Acupuncture Society. The name of the closest to you can be acquired from the secretary of the Australian Veterinary Acupuncture Association, whose number is available through the Australian Veterinary Association.

PAW-NOTE - First Hand Experience:

Take one sneezing cat, add 2 courses of antibiotics only to have the sneezing resume immediately after the medication stopped. Just into the third course I thought this was silly - this wasn't a cold I was fighting - there was something else wrong.

Luckily a friend had just had her cat treated for a spinal problem so I phoned the practitioner and described Zario's symptoms. The vet could not guarantee a result but advised that we would know by the first treatment if acupuncture would work. There was a modest improvement. By the next treatment he was much better and after 6 visits the sneezing stopped. The problem? A food allergy. After 18 months of trouble free life, the symptoms are

starting again and he is back for another term of treatments. But it certainly beats medication.

His first acupuncturist used a laser treatment but he has since retired. Now Pam Short has the task of putting Zario to rights. Before the first visit I was not happy about having needles instead of laser and I was even less happy as they were inserted. But I was the only one worried, the procedure bothered Zario not at all. And even when he had to lie with needles sticking out of various bodily parts, he gave no indication of distress. His only movement was to carefully put his needled head into the security of my arm and he quietly stayed there until the treatment was finished and the needles removed. Pam advised that even cranky cats are easy to handle and seem to have so problems with the treatment. Lee Wright


THE SAGITTARIUS CAT


CATS AS CATS CAN

PET SHOP PUSSIES

Krista Cassars Pet & Grooming Centre

In the last issue there were concerns about pet shops selling kittens and cats. I am the manager of Cassars's Pet and Grooming Centre, Blacktown, and I would like to introduce you to my pet shop and the way I run things.

Many boxes of cats have been left at the front and back door of my shop, from only a couple of days old to adults. Some of these have been starving, covered in fleas and in such a state of distress that it is hard to imagine. We have taken all of these felines in immediately. They are given a general health check as I have had several years of veterinary nursing experience. Babes are bottle fed until they are about 4 weeks. All of our staff participate in feeding, cleaning and loving each and every one. Older kittens and cats are taken to our local vet the same day for vaccination, worming and a full health check.

My background in dealing with cats comes from my vet nursing which covers a lot of adventures. The most exciting was the opportunity to hand raise a jaguar cub from 4 hours to 6 months old. Returning Leeroy was one of the hardest things that I have ever had to do but I was then asked to raise two Siberian tiger cubs, Cloe and Zoe.

The cruelty to animals that I have come across while nursing made me realize how important it is for an animal to be in the right house for the right reasons and my way of helping ensure that was to become a pet shop manager. So I did!!

People come in and out of pet shops all day, dreaming of what they would like to buy and when someone decides to buy a kitten, their approach is often, "I would like to buy that very small, cute little kitten, please". My reply is, "Yes, he is lovely, but do you know what is involved in having a cat: desexing, feeding, grooming, etc." Most people give me a funny look because I am very up front, and then I remind them that people do not choose cats, they choose you! The right cat for you will be the one who would like to be with you the most, not which one is prettier. Kittens grow into cats and do not stay small for long.

Just because people have the money for an animal does not necessarily mean they can buy it. If I feel that the animal would not suit their lifestyle I will refuse the sale and suggest something more suitable. I would rather miss the sale than live with myself knowing that an animal went to a non-suitable home just because of a dollar sign.

All our animals are treated like they are our very own. After all, they are ours until they are adopted. Great care is taken to ensure that every cat and kitten is safe, well and very happy. The way we do this is by giving them clean blankets in baskets, toys, litter trays which are disinfected twice daily, and a scratching post. We regularly handle and love each one as we like our cats to be smoochers, the way a well loved cat should be.

We used to offer people a 10% discount on desexing but I was only reasonably happy with the success rate. So I tried again. I wanted

to sell only desexed, microchipped, vaccinated and wormed cats and kits to help stop this horribly cruel and callous 'kitten season' that comes every year. Last year I sold 657 kittens with the discount vouchers and approximately 40% were desexed. But what about the 60% that were not? How many kittens would be produced from those animals for the next kitten season? So I decided to go the next step myself.

With many thanks to the CPS, who contacted many vets on my behalf, I finally found a terrific vet who was willing to assist and thought that my idea was great. This vet surgery is the Mt Druitt Veterinary Hospital with Dr Stewart and Dr Thomas and their nurses, Kerry and Louise. I found their enthusiasm to help was beyond reproach and many thanks go to them, as this would not be possible to do without their co-operation. They gave us excellent prices so we could have all our cats and kits desexed and still be able to sell them at reasonable prices.

My hope is to set a standard for other pet shops and, hopefully, more will follow our example and only sell desexed cats and kittens. Just think, if we only sell half the amount of kittens that are desexed this year - what a difference that will make on the quantity of unwanted kittens next kitten season.

Not all pet shops cater for their animals in the way we do, but there are not many bad pet shops either. I have found that most people who work in pet shops are in that position because they have devoted their lives to animals. Unfortunately, some of them are not in a position to be able to refuse the sales and the managers do not encourage it either! People do not seem to understand that pet shops are under the toughest rules and regulations and are checked on by authorities regularly. A code of practice is in force and must be followed by all pet shops.

Some people are led to believe that people own pet shops because of the money. Well that is the funniest thing that I have ever heard! One thing is for sure, don't own a pet shop if you want to make money! Animals cost you more than you make, it is purely a love job, and more people should realise this fact! Animals in pet shops have 24 hour care, are closely monitored, constantly cleaned, exercised, bathed, played with and fed extremely well.

People often ask 'what happens to the young animals that don't find homes?'. Well in my shop nothing, they stay here until they are adopted. We do not take them to a pound or anywhere else. After all, they are all our babies, no matter how big or small. We have only ever been unable to find a suitable home for one bull mastiff cross ridgeback called Lady. What happened to her? Well, she went to our farm and has been there ever since.

I hope that this has given you a chance to see what goes on in my shop and really make you realize how much time, love, affection and especially work, goes into running a pet shop. It is certainly not easy, that's for sure. But we do it because we love all animals and accepting responsibilities such as finding suitable homes for animals and selling them desexed and microchipped is a part of our contribution to the animals of the world. Pet shops should be setting the example for all pet owners.

CAT WHISPERING

Is it for you and your cat?

Cat whispering? Is that like horse whispering? A cat would look pretty funny with a bridle, stirrups and a saddle ... Have you seen the movie and wondered? Is it possible with your cat?

WHO AM I?

In my work as an "Animal Communicator", I speak to cats daily. Their owners ring to say that their feline's behaviour is not what it used to be (ie, the cat has begun urinating in the house, it won't come in at night, it appears depressed and cries loudly at 'nothing' or other problems). The next question is "Can you help?"

WHAT DO I DO?

My role consists of arriving at their home and greeting the temporarily out-of-sorts feline. After sensing their initial emotional state in my own heart and body, I will ask their owner a few pertinent questions to begin our counselling session.

What comes forth in my mind is often a few words or phrases about how the cat is feeling and what has caused this pain or anger to occur. I will then "see" in my mind pictures of events, people, other animals or whatever the cat chooses to mentally/ telepathically send me. They do this in order to explain, often in great detail, what their perception is of the situation. These pictures will come with a great deal of emotion and sometimes momentarily, physical discomfort, which I feel in my own body.

After a session like this, both the owner and the cat have a chance to explain each of their views. Many times a better understanding occurs as the owner recognises what could be done differently next time. Often the cat realises that the most important thing is that their owner loves them regardless of what incident has occurred.

WHY I BECAME AN ANIMAL COMMUNICATOR

The main reason I became involved in this type of counselling work due to my love of animals and my affinity with them. All my life the emotions that an animal was feeling became mine for a moment or even much longer. It was the knowledge that these were their deepest feelings even though their body was relaxed and their actual behaviour was neutral. It felt to me to be an "inner truth". At the time I didn't know how I could understand them so well, however, the unconditional love which they would send me would make me want to spend as much time as possible in their company.

With my Bachelor of Science degree and 6 years experience working as a counsellor, I was able to negotiate a suitable arrangement with the two cat teachers, Bonnie and Jac, who lived next door. While I was practicing my medium/psychic skills and completing a Diploma in Remedial (Alternative) Therapies, I realised that I could combine my natural gifted skills with additional knowledge in order to help animals and their owners become closer and more in a spiritual union with each other.

A CASE HISTORY

In recent years, Bonnie and Tiger Jac, the two cats owned by the caring and nurturing neighbour next door, allowed me to realise that they had their own feelings and thoughts. Bonnie was continually looking for someone to love and pet her although she was too frightened to allow others near her. She began by telling me of her fear of



me and what I needed to do to reassure her that her presence in our yard was acceptable. Bonnie would often say to me "I missed you, I haven't seen you for a few days. Can you be nice to me now? Please scratch my fur and I will love you and let you be my friend." (Which was something quite special as she ran away from most people or animals). She would always be at the car door when we arrived home to tell me what happened during the day. "Stroke me and give me your love, please," she would request regularly.

The other half of this team was her housemate, Jac. We added the Tiger due to her stripes and her proud way of strolling. She was very defiant and her emotions often felt quite angry. When she chose to speak telepathically I would hear, "You never feed me or let me in your house. I don't like you!?" And then she would walk into the house briefly to show that she could do what she wanted. Jac would then leave the house and sit in front of me with her back to me, refusing to continue our conversation.

WHAT DID I LEARN BY SPEAKING TO CATS?

As I encountered more and more cat clients, I began to realise that many of the inherent problems experienced by domesticated cats are due to their frustration on having had many soul lifetimes as large forest/range cats like the lion, tiger, ocelot, puma and jaguar. In 1998, many feline souls have a much more limited choice of bodies to inhabit. When they reincarnate, they must work very hard to accept a very different life. Once most cats realise the luxuries of this new lifestyle, most are content to accept it. But there are always a few who simply cannot forget the past. For these cats, a compassionate approach and further research to develop an understanding of what their life might have been like will help enormously. Animals enjoy having a compatible relationship built on understanding, compassion and trust.

To some people, these thoughts may be contrary to popular accepted belief. However, once an owner is willing to initiate an alternative approach with their cat, then the cat will more than likely recognise their owner's willingness to change their attitude and to find a way to achieve a reconciliation. Often, the cat will immediately recognise that the love their owner has for them is more important than their original stand which only made them feel angry and disappointed.

HOW TO BEGIN

Many individuals believe that they can communicate with their animal. However, they don't tell everyone for fear of ridicule. On sending a thought about food or a walk, an outing, many animals will come running long before their owner calls them. If the cat is unhappy, it will often sit and look at its owner, sending them very strong thoughts about what has caused this displeasure. Then, their facial features or body position or meows confirms this picture. It is important to recognise that the picture of words or emotions are often sent long before you recognise physical cues.

Telepathic communication is possible with all animals no matter what the species is or how much communication an animal may have had with humans (ie feral cats, wild animals). The important thing is the willingness to truly understand your cat without prejudice must be present before you can begin. The other critical element must be unconditional love (regardless of the annoyance).

All you need to do is to think of a few questions which may be puzzling you about your cat. Questions such as 'Are you happy?;, "Why do you do ...x..?", "How do you feel about ..y..?". Write the questions down in a notebook as it well assist you in remembering what you wanted to know. You may be so amazed when your cat begins to tell you things that you then become distracted.

Plan an initial 5 minute session with your cat where you can sit with it in your lap or in its basket. By stroking, brushing or massaging them lightly, they will become quite relaxed and will be more likely to want to engage in communication with you in this way. Initially send them your love and acceptance. Then think about your appreciation for their existence. Thank them for choosing to spend their life and time with you and your family.

Pick your question and send your cat a mental picture (ie "what is your favourite food?"). Send a picture of their empty bowl. Then, let your mind go blank. The answer will come to you, often immediately. Begin to trust your initial reaction of feelings. Also, remember to listen to all that your cat has to say before you make a statement. By listening to each word, phrase or picture which you are sent, often all of these can be pieced together to represent an even greater message of devotion, appreciation, frustration, hesitation, fear, anger, or indeed, any other situation or emotion.

CONCLUSION

With many people acquiring new skills, is it any wonder that animal communication is booming? Next time your cat wants to tell you something, relax your mind, clear it from the day to day clutter and see 'what's new' with your furry friend.

Feature ArtiSt A U N KENDALL



My mum bought me watercolours when I was 3 and I've been creating ever since. I grew up on a large farm in Queensland. I was 8 when cats first came into my life. My dad found two female 'bush cat' kittens under some farm machinery. He brought these wild hissing fur balls into the house and I was mesmerised. Before long they became quiet and we had them fed and snuggled in some towels, their purring echoing off the sides of the cardboard box.

It wasn't long before one of the cats started to bulge. This prompted my Mum to take the other to the vet to be desexed. The mother-to-be, Little Mama, made a nest under my bunk bed which didn't go down well with Mum. We tried to put Little Mama into a beautifully furnished nesting box but it wasn't the same. Finally, on the big morning, Mum brought her out from under the bed one last time and I guess because Little Mama was so close to giving birth, she stayed in the box with Auntie Cat looking on.

Three beautiful and very different kittens were born. Annabella, a tortoiseshell, a white and grey male named Gnarlin' My Darlin', and a silver tabby, Jake. I drew lots of pictures of them when I was young, portraying the different cat moods and personalities, sometimes just pages of nothing but eyes, everything from the sleepy hooded eyes to the hugely dilated 'I've got a dog on my tail' look. As I reflect back to when I was growing up, I see just how much of my days were filled with my cats. I had lots of other pets as well, but it was Jake and his family that touched me most.

Whenever I was feeling out of sorts one of the cats would find me and rub themselves on my legs, letting me know that everything would be okay. I could be working outside in the garden when I would hear very loud meowing coming from the other side of the house where Gnarl would be sleeping. Slowly he'd pick his way across the lawn through the prickle patch, shaking his feet as he went, and careful not to disturb the sleeping dogs. Sometimes I'd go for a long walk and on the last homeward kilometre all five cats would be darting out of the long grass onto the road, then back into the grass again, pouncing and ambushing each other. The Cats were always around.

I loved the fact they all had different personalities. Some ate fast, almost inhaling their food, some ate slowly and methodically. Some stayed lean and caught mice, some got a little large around the middle and would only run if forced. Some liked being vacuumed - others would be out the door at the mere sight. They especially loved it when my Mum would come home with

groceries and there would be all sorts of bags and boxes. Jake and Gnarl would put on a sort of cat rodeo. There was lots of chewing of cardboard, jumping in and out of boxes, skidding on bags across the floor, rolling around and being silly. My mother and I would be in stitches which spurred them on to further effort.

Its all these elements I draw upon as I bring the cat images into my art. So far all the cats I have done have been in hand coloured lino prints because I find it lends itself so well to the way I see them in my mind. I like to distil the images down to a few lines and forms that suggest their mood. I am always anxious to see the first print from the press and even though I know what the facial expressions will be, there is always a magical element of surprise.

I also paint acrylics and oils of landscapes and my impressions of nature. These are usually large canvases and boards and are quite a different perspective altogether. I started printing the cats and other animals a few years ago because of a talk I had with my husband, Robert. I was telling him 'cat stories' and was showing him all their different moods and postures. He suggested with all the enthusiasm I had for cats I ought to somehow capture them. At first I baulked at the idea because it didn't seem 'fine art' enough, and that people would laugh at my work (some did). However, I decided to go ahead anyway and print the first set of lino's. I entered them in a local show and, much to my surprise and delight, a cat loving art gallery manager wanted the prints for her gallery at Mt Tambourine, Qld. I haven't looked back since.

The prints have been so popular, we decided to diversify and put the cat and dog images into cards and gift wraps. We've called our business Barking Dog Designs because we wanted a name we couldn't take too seriously. We want to stay mindful of humour because business can be very serious sometimes and we need our furry friends to remind us to relax and have fun while we're at it.


WE GO TO THE PUBLIC



There has not been any matter or circumstance, other than that referred to in the accounts or notes thereto, that has arisen since the end of the financial year, that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect, the company's operations, the results of those operations, or the company's state of affairs in financial years after the financial year.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Society is looking at establishing a cattery to home cats, eliminating the cost of existing boarding arrangements. A separate reserve has been established for this development. Apart from the point noted above, it is the expectation of the directors that the society will continue with the activities described above with results similar to those of the past year.
