



# Ask the Cattery Manager

I am a Cat Protection member and I am ashamed to say that my eighteen-year-old daughter was out shopping with friends recently and decided on impulse to purchase a kitten she had seen in a pet shop window. We are going to keep the kitten but I want my daughter to understand that she has acted irresponsibly. What points can you offer to help me do this?

Working at Cat Protection and seeing the countless number of unwanted cats and kittens has made me come to the conclusion that animals should not be allowed to be sold in pet shops at all. It never ceases to astound me that while thousands of animals are already homeless and dying in shelters every year, pet shops are selling animals for profit.

The animals are usually sourced from puppy and kitten mills or backyard breeders whose main interest is not the welfare of the animals but rather to make a profit. Prior to arriving at pet shops the animals are often housed in filthy conditions, confined to cages where they have hardly any room to move and used for breeding purposes over and over again until they are no longer of use and are euthanased. Many die prior to this point from uterine infections, poor nutrition, diseases and neglect. This occurs while at the same time over 130,000 unwanted dogs and 60,000 unwanted cats are already dying in pounds and shelters every year in NSW alone.

Another huge problem is that your average pet shops sell animals like a retail item. They are usually situated in shopping centres with baby animals displayed in glass boxes in the window. The animals are merchandised to attract the attention of passers by, their "cuteness factor" resulting in impulse purchases with no thought for the proper care, the long-term future or the financial costs involved in sharing your life with an animal. The staff are under pressure to sell the animals before they get "too big" because the adults are too hard to sell. Pups and kittens that grow to around 6 months of age are

deemed unsuitable for purchase and may end up at the local pound. There is a lot of pressure to get the animals out to any home or as a surprise gift be it suitable or not, before they get too old. This contributes greatly to unwanted animals being dumped.

The pet shop staff may not be trained or required to discuss the costs, time and effort involved in the proper care of the animal and many animals end up being given away or surrendered to welfare organisations. The impulsive nature of pet shop purchases means that for most people the novelty of their new pet wears off pretty quickly, usually when the responsibility involved becomes apparent and they are unable to cope with it.

I estimate that half of the cats who are surrendered to us came from a pet shop originally; many of them are females, often with their litters because the animal they bought was not desexed.

For more information there is an organisation called Say No to animals in pet shops, they have a very informative website

**www.saynotoanimalsinpetshops.com**, I thoroughly recommend that your daughter looks this site up and shows it to her friends.

I firmly believe that impulse buys are a major contributing factor to the already overwhelming problem we face with unwanted animals, and it isn't only dogs and cats that suffer, it's fish, birds and pocket pets such as rabbits, guinea pigs, rats and mice. I advise everyone to let their friends, family or anyone that they know who may be thinking of adopting a new furry family member to save a life at a shelter. Support shelters by boycotting pet shops, start a petition insisting pet shops no longer are allowed to sell live animals. You can then send it to:

# Fat-Cats

ot only is the human population getting fatter, so too are our feline friends. When our cats become overweight we need to look at why, how and WHO!!

Obesity is the most common nutritional disease of dogs and cats. It is an excess of body fats and is associated with many health problems. Obesity occurs in 20-30% of pet dogs and cats. It is most common in older animals and females



Your cat's ideal weight will be dependent on a number of variants, your vet is probably the best person to talk to about your individual cats ideal weight.

Most domestic cats should weigh below 5 kg.

Here is a rough guide to your cats weight status produced by Hills Science Diet:

- My cat's belly wobbles from side to side when he/she walks or runs
- I cannot feel my cat's ribs without applying a fair amount of pressure
- My cats is obsessed with food
- My cat is having difficulty reaching around to groom
- My cat is inactive most of the time
- My cat looks overweight
- ☐ I have had to loosen my cats' collar several times over the last year
- My cat is having difficulty getting through the cat door

(The brave can also replace "my cat" with your own name and see how you go; I unfortunately ticked all of them apart from the collar question)

If you ticked any of the above for your cat then it may be advisable to speak to your veterinarian about some options for reducing the weight of your feline friend.



## What Causes a Cat to Get Fat?

The idea that desexing an animal makes it fat is a myth. Any animal that is overfed (in relation to its energy requirements) will get fat. Desexing may slightly slow the animal's metabolism, as does aging, and your cat may be less active after desexing but this is simply remedied by giving less food.

A cat becomes overweight or obese for a number of reasons. The main is overfeeding by loving owners, but there are other factors too including genetic make up and level of activity.

These days good quality dry food diets contain more energy per mouthful than tinned foods or lesser quality dry foods. This means that we need to feed our cats less of these concentrated foods, but some of us don't do that.

## Potential Problems with Fat Cats

Typical problems associated with fat cats include diabetes, arthritis and a serious disorder called hepatic lipidosis. Further, there is an increased risk of heart and circulatory disorders, arthritis, diabetes, heat intolerance and skin disease. There are also cases that link fat cats with asthma, irritable bowel syndrome and pancreatitis. <sup>111</sup>


## How Do t Slim Down My Cat?

Well we all know the answer to this:

#### Eat less and exercise more!!!

Ok, so it is not as easy as it sounds, especially with the amount of time that cats are spending indoors and the inability to resist the desperate meows of our felines friends for more food.

> Talk to your veterinarian. It is very important to establish the ideal weight for each individual cat and work slowly towards it.



2. Slowly move to a low calorie, light or diet food. You need to be careful that reducing your cats fat intake does not lead to other health problems, so again this should be done in consultation with your vet. We use and recommend Hills Science Diet Light and there are also prescription diets available from your vet.

3. Change the feeding pattern of your cat. Do not allow unlimited access to food and try feeding 2-4 small meals a day.

- 4. Weight watchers for cats! Keep a weight diary with weekly or fortnightly weigh ins.
- 5. Try and set aside active play time, especially for indoor cats, to make sure that your cat is doing some exercise every day. Make sure exercise is fun! Cats can enjoy 'play hunting' toys to increase their exercise levels.



# Your Eats Life

### A Welfare Officer's Perspective

eing a Welfare Officer at CPS I daily receive jobs concerning injured, lost and stray cats.

I am asked on most occasions what can the cat owner do to help stop this occurring again?

The answer is simple, **KEEP YOUR CATS INDOORS!!!!** 

Many people argue about the life an indoors only cat leads but let me put it this way; if you owned a dog would you let it roam the streets? No you would keep it in a fenced yard. If you own a bird do you let it fly outside to return home when it wants? No, you would keep the bird enclosed in an aviary or fly inside the house. Why is there a different set of rules for cats then?

## Why keep cats inside?

Did you know the life span of an outside cat is on average only 5 years? The life span of an inside cat is up to 20yrs!!

Cats kill and injure hundreds of wild animals every year. Wildlife carers see many cases of badly injured wildlife that are the result of cat attacks every day.

Your cats health is put at risk every time it walks out of your house, stray cats can carry diseases, like Feline Aids and Chlamydia, that can be passed on to your cat. Catfights can also be harmful to your cat as abscesses from wounds can become infected and may become fatal. Unfortunately not everyone in the world is an animal lover and to me one of the most important reasons to keep your cat indoors is animal cruelty. I have sadly had to deal with a few cases of cats injured or worse killed by a cruel person. Animals cannot defend themselves against these people and can be horribly affected mentally when they recover from the injuries we can see.

Cars are a big killer of animals, we all see it as we walk or drive down a road. It's not the best feeling to walk out one day and see your much-loved pet dead from a hit and run.

### Keeping your cat happy indoors.

Just because you are keeping your cat indoors does not mean your cat will be unhappy. You might be amazed on how much the opposite is true! Cats have been domestic for 6000 years now so don't believe it when you are told "cats are hunters, they need to be outdoors."

A cat may turn back to its hunting instinct when left outside, but this urge to hunt things can be sated inside without a poor native animal having to be the prey.

Get toys for your cat, there are hundreds available, and many are rodent shaped so your cat can happily hunt them and kill them over again.

Make your home cat friendly; get scratching posts and cat climbers, hammocks and cat lounges. If you're worried about the look of your house build a cat enclosure outside.

By installing a cat door to the enclosure you can put the cat things out in the enclosure and your cat can come and go safely. Many different companies make mesh or wire enclosures so your cat can enjoy the outdoors without the hazards. You can also buy a harness and lead for your cat and walk it regularly outside if you're worried the cat needs time outside.

Many cats thrive on human attention and will become a lot more affectionate to you if kept inside where it will receive more love from you.

Finally remember to have your cat desexed and microchipped.

Desexing will stop your cat wanting to stray and find a mate, and if your cat does manage to escape having it microchipped means you may get it back a lot quicker (it is also illegal not to have your cat microchipped in NSW!!!)

Please help make my job a little easier and happier by keeping your cat inside.

PS: your cat will thank you!!!!!!!

# Summer Cats ts

ummer is a time for both you and your pet to enjoy the warmer weather, but along with the fun, summer can also present problems may endanger your pet. By taking precautions, you can decrease the chance of your cat(s) being at risk.

Shelter/Bedding

If your cat is allowed outdoors please ensure there is some shady shelter and fresh cool water available to your pet at all times of the day no matter where the sun is in the sky.

Holidays

If you cannot get someone to come to your house to feed your cat (the ideal situation from your cat's point of view) then ensure you only board him/her at a reputable cattery. If your cattery does not ask you to provide proof that your cat has a current vaccination, do not board your cat at such a place as you may expose your cat to non-vaccinated cats. It is a good idea to inspect any unfamiliar, potential boarding premises to ensure you are happy with the accommodation and conditions before you make a booking. Reputable catteries are happy for you to do this.

Grooming

Cats tend to shed their winter coats in late Spring/early Summer and you may need to help your cat along in the grooming process by removing excess hair with a daily brush or by patting your cat all over with a slightly damp hand, removing excess fur. Pay particular attention to the cat's underline and tail. This grooming process will also help combat the formation of fur-balls.

Hazards

**Fireworks:** Most pets are extremely frightened by fireworks. Ensure your cat is locked safely inside when you know fireworks are being staged. Whilst this may not stop him/her being scared, it will ensure they do not run off and become lost.

**Sunburn:** Pets can get sunburned too, and your pet may require sunscreen on his/her nose and ear tips if he/she has access to direct sunlight. Cats with light-coloured noses or light-coloured fur on their ears are particularly venerable to sunburn and skin cancer.

Cars: Don't leave any pets in parked cars for any period of time, ever. They can die from heatstroke in a matter of minutes on a warm day.

Fleas

Fleas can be a major problem for cats, especially in Summer when fleas are most active. There are numerous products to choose from which will help eradicate fleas and sometimes an integrated flea control program may be necessary to ensure your feline stays flea-free (ie. you may need to treat your cat and flea bomb your house). Cats can also pick up internal parasites through fleas and by eating bugs and other creatures. Regular worming every three months will help keep these parasites to a minimum. At CPS uses "Advantage" as a very effective flea treatment.

Ticks

There are many different types of ticks in Australia, but it is the paralysis tick which threaten cats with death. The paralysis tick is found primarily in coastal areas on the Australian east coast.

Ticks can attach themselves to their host (often cats or dogs) and suck blood - while doing this the tick releases a toxin into the host. Cats (or dogs) become ill very quickly and it is important that you seek veterinary assistance as soon as you find a tick or have a cat with any of the following symptoms, uncoordinated, muscle weakness, difficulty standing, difficulty breathing or swallowing, a change in voice or vomiting.

Examine your cat everyday using the "finger-crawl" technique. Run your hands over the cat feeling for ticks that have attached themselves rather than relying on sight. Don't forget to check under the collar, between paw pads and in the ears and mouth. Of course keeping your cat inside greatly reduces the chances of him/her coming in contact with fleas, ticks and bugs.

Diet

Apart from the normal balanced diet your cat requires, in summer the main issue is water. Ensure he/she has access to plenty of cool, fresh water. Ensure your cat's water bowl is kept in a cool, shady spot and change bowls frequently (a couple of ice cubes are a good idea in the water bowl to really give some relief to your cat on a hot day). For extra insurance, keep a couple of water bowls around in case one should get knocked over or evaporate. Large, sturdy bowls are the ideal option.


