

n May this year, our Executive Officer, Lynda O' Grady resigned from Cat Protection after five tireless years of working for the society. One of Lynda's many accomplishments was to oversee the renovation of our premises on Enmore Rd, and officially open the new building in March 2003. All the staff wish Lynda the best for the future.

My name is Cate Kerr and I have stepped into Lynda's role after working in our welfare office for the past two years. I am hoping to continue the Society's commitment to the promotion of early age desexing, and our assistance to the community through our discounted desexing programs. I am also aiming to ensure the operation of our Adoption Centre in Newtown remains one of the best rehoming facilities in Sydney, finding new homes for many abandoned and unwanted cats and kittens.

With the continuation of a long and sunny summer, we are still being inundated with unwanted and abandoned kittens. It is unbelievable to have so many kittens at this time of year still coming to us. Winter normally brings a slightly quieter time for us, with breeding season over for another year. The reduction in kitten numbers normally brings on a great opportunity for us to rehome many of the beautiful adults that get overlooked during kitten season. This may not be the case this year, and at the time of writing, we still have over 20 adorable kittens (and 30 adults) awaiting adoption, which is unprecedented for this time of year.

We welcomed two new staff members in May this year. Amy Karp is working as a Customer Service Officer in the Welfare Office. Vanessa Williams has been employed as a casual welfare officer to help our two full-time Officers get through the massive backlog of work. Vanessa has been volunteering in our Cattery for the past year and has been an invaluable asset to our Welfare section.

Open Day

Our Open Day this year will be in October to coincide with World Animal Day. The day will be on Sunday 9th October, and we will be inviting all members and their

friends and family to have a wander through our fully renovated facility at Newtown, and meet some of the lovely cats and kittens for adoption.

Mational Desexing Network

The national desexing network, an initiative of the Animal Welfare League in Qld, offers grants to organisations to assist in the promotion of desexing female cats who have had kittens, and whose kittens are surrendered to animal

welfare agencies.

Cat Protection has been lucky enough to secure a grant of \$3500, allowing us to offer free desexing for 100 female cats. In a show of support for the concept, the Cat Protection board has equalled the offer, which means that we will be in a position to offer 200 free desexings next breeding season, and

hopefully further impact on the number of unwanted and abandoned kittens surrendered to us and other welfare agencies every summer.

e have thousands of cats and kittens surrendered to us here at Cat Protection every year. All the cats that come to us and are placed into our Adoption Centre are health checked, desexed, microchipped and vaccinated, all at considerable cost to the Society. Some cats that come to us need extra special assistance before they are suitable for adoption into a new home.

Under normal circumstances, these cats may not have the opportunity to be placed into our Adoption Centre.

We are undertaking to set up a "Special Case Cat Fund" with all donations going directly to the extra special requirements of these cats. We are hoping to raise \$5000, to utilise specifically for the care of these cats for the next 12 months.

If you can make a donation to this new Fund, you will be assisting in saving the life of some of these special cases.

These extra special cats may require:

- ♥ Special operation up to \$500
- **♥** Anaesthesia for a clip up to \$200
- For the older cats, a dental to clean their teeth up to \$100
- Special blood tests up to \$100

The Story of Little Tara...

n December 2004 we had a tiny five week old kitten surrendered. Two girls had watched in horror as their friend's boyfriend flew into a rage because the kitten scratched him while playing rescued her. He kicked the kitten across the room and then picked her up and threw her at the wall causing one of her eyes to

come out of its socket

We took the kitten to Pet Vets at

Petersham immediately where she was
assessed and it was decided in order for the kitten to
survive the eye would need to be removed. We
decided to go ahead with the procedure as we were all
in agreement that this little lady had to have a second
chance.

Once she had recovered we were able to find the kitten a loving, caring home with John Fell, a Pilates instructor. John and his partner named the kitten Tara after the Buddhist Goddess "White Tara" who has seven divine eyes; they thought their little Tara could do with extra eyes to keep her safe.

Tara has grown into a beautiful cat. John says, "she is a real part of the family who has bought light into our lives, we can't thank you enough for giving her a second chance." Tara loves to snooze on the bed under the doona and is always on the balcony meowing down to greet them when they arrive home.

Tara shares her home with two rabbits "Imelda" (who considers herself the boss) and "Phoebe". The three get on very well together, particularly Tara and Phoebe who love to play.

Tara lives happily as an indoor only cat. She doesn't suffer at all from having one eye and has adapted very easily; when she hears a noise on that side she now responds by turning her ear towards it rather than her whole head.

assistance of the many Vet clinics that assist us, including Petersham, Croydon Park Veterinary Clinic and Concord Animal Hospital, saving Tara's life would have been almost impossible. The cost of removing Tara's eye and the subsequent treatment would have normally come to over \$600. With the generosity of a massive discount from the Petersham Vet Clinic, we were able to go ahead and save Tara's life. The overall cost of the procedure still came to \$150, along with the cost of desexing, microchipping and vaccinating, and the weeks of treatment required post surgery, meant that her adoption cost of \$130 didn't come close to covering the costs.

We hope that with your generosity, we will be able to assist the next Tara that comes along...

Super big thanks to all you choice people at the Cat Protection Society - love ya! Thanks for taking me in, getting me in good working order and putting me in touch


with my Ma. She's pretty stoked with me.

2. Bad Boy Basil'



Ask the Manager

My cat always seems to have fleas, I use powder and a flea collar but it doesn't seem to help. What can I do?

The first thing you should do is flea bomb your house to get rid of any fleas in the immediate environment. A Fido's flea bomb will do one average sized room so you may need to get a few to do the areas your cat has access to. Take care to read the safety instructions to ensure you do not poison your cat or any other animals in the home.

You should then wash all animal bedding in very hot water and detergent and hang it to dry in the sun.

Powders and collars are not very effective in the fight against fleas, powders aren't able to penetrate the coat and get shaken off, collars lose their effectiveness very quickly and tend to just make the fleas go to the back of the cat where they can continue feeding and breeding.

There are a few excellent products available now. Frontline spray is good to use in particularly bad infestations as it kills the fleas on contact. This can be used every two weeks if necessary, but is usually applied monthly. Frontline is also available in a monthly Top Spot which is applied to the back of the

neck; Top Spot is more effective once the initial infestation has been controlled.

The flea treatment product we use most commonly at Cat Protection is Advantage; this comes in two dose rates:
Kitten (for cats up to 4kg) and Adult (for cats over 4kg). Always make sure you use the corresponding

dose to your cat's weight as overdosing can cause toxicity and illness. Advantage is also applied to the back of the neck. It is absorbed into the subcutaneous fat layer and spreads over the whole body.

It kills adult and larval fleas within 20 minutes.
It breaks down the flea's life cycle and kills fleas collected in infested

month. When treating your cat with Advantage or Frontline make sure you keep up to date with your three monthly worming treatments. Cat Protection recommends Drontal All wormer for cats.

environments for up to a

Worming is also done by weight so take care not to overdose or under dose your cat.

Kittens can be treated with Felex worming paste every two weeks until they are 12 weeks old.

Revolution and Advocate are also fleat reatment products with a bonus; they not only treat fleas but also treat and prevent roundworm, hookworm and heartworm.

The only worm they don't treat is tapeworm.

Tapeworm is one of the most common intestinal worms and can be transmitted by fleas and undercooked meat, so when using Revolution or Advocate it is important to administer a three-monthly

Gring with EFeline Atlergieses

iving with, or developing, feline allergies can have an overwhelming affect on your life. Fortunately there are several options for pet owners who have allergies to cats, and other animals, rather than the awful prospect of having to give up your pet.

Animal allergies are normally quite specific. People may be allergic to a particular species of animal, or perhaps even a particular animal within a species. People who suffer allergies can display a multitude of symptoms, from itchy eyes and skin, runny nose, rashes and asthma symptoms.

In dealing with, or attempting to live with, animal allergies (particularly cat allergies) it is important that we understand the way in which these allergies work. There are many cat allergens; the most common cat allergen is found mainly on skin and saliva. Your cat sheds this allergen through its dander (dead skin that is continually shed into the environment) or through the allergen being left on cat hair that has your cats saliva on it.

There are many ways that people with differing degrees of cat allergies learn to live happily with their feline friend. Here are a few:

1. Hardwood floors

A house with hardwood or vinyl floors and the minimal use of carpets, soft furnishings, and draperies will be easier to clean and less attracting of allergens.

2. Don't let your cat sleep on your bed

Allowing your cat to sleep on your bed means that their dander and hair will be all over your bed, and in your doona, and therefore increase your allergies, some with symptoms that are particularly problematic at night.

3. Don't let your cat into your bedroom at all

For those with severe allergies, this is definitely a way to reduce symptoms. We spend almost half our time at home in our bedrooms, so keeping your cat/s out will help reduce the presence of cat allergen. If your cats aren't used to going into your bedroom, then they won't know what they're missing!! Make sure you have plenty of other cosy spots for them to sleep.

For those who ignore suggestion 1, 2 & 3.....

3. Wash all your bedding in hot water at least twice monthly

Washing all your bedding in hot water eliminates both dust might and cat allergen.

Install a HEPA air filter in rooms and where your cat frequents

A HEPA (high efficiency particulate air) filter can assist in the cleaning of the air in your home.

5. Use HEPA vacuum cleaners

Use the vacuum cleaner everywhere! Vacuum carpets, flooring, chairs and furniture.

(*NB There is some debate as to the effectiveness of HEPA cleaners)

6. Use a vapour steamer to clean your house

Steam cleaners provide a great way of cleaning and removing dust mites, bacteria, mold spores and cat allergen.

7. Clean and brush your cat regularly

Washing your cat can reduce the amount of cat allergen that is released from your cat into the air. There are conflicting theories as to whether washing your cat will assist or not, but it's worth trying.

Brushing may reduce the shed of cat allergens into your living environment.

Wash your hands immediately after patting your cat and avoid contact with your eyes

Washing your hands with an anti-bacterial wash directly after handling may reduce the allergic reaction.

10. Keep your cats' skin healthy by feeding a high quality food and possibly even a fatty acid supplement

TRY STEPS 1-10 and SPEAK TO YOUR LOCAL GP BEFORE TRYING TO REHOME YOUR CAT!!

Have your allergies tested before accepting that you are only allergic to the cat. It may be a combination of different allergens that are affecting your health. Speak to your GP about alternative treatments and medications.



Day in the Life Assistant Cattery Manager

Georgina Smith Adoption Centre Assistant Manager

eorgina has been a vital member of the cattery team for over four years, the longest existing staff member since she started in 2001. She initially began working as an Animal Attendant until 18mths ago when she was promoted to the Assistant Cattery Manager position. Georgina has brought knowledge and experience to Cat Protection through her previous work experience and study.

Georgina grew up with animals, having a menagerie of cats, dogs, ducks and chickens. After finishing school she began volunteering at the RSPCA and it was this experience that opened her eyes to many of the injustices animals endure. She commenced study at TAFE in Animal Science and gained part-time employment at a breeding cattery. The experience of working at the cattery reinforced her desire to stick with the welfare side rather than the commercial aspects of a breeding cattery. It was from here that she gained employment at Cat Protection.

In Georgina's role as Assistant manager she is responsible for cleaning, feeding and medicating the cats; assisting the Manager decide which animals are appropriate for re-homing; re-homing itself, and then to finish it all off - another feed and clean at the end of the day. Georgina has also worked at many of the Cat Protection stalls at various festivals and has fostered many kittens that have been too young for rehoming.

What Georgina most enjoys about working at Cat Protection is the opportunity to make a difference to the lives of cats. The adoption process that has been developed at Cat Protection means Georgina can go home knowing she has done her best to find a good home for the cats that have been abandoned. It is the education side of her work that Georgina feels is very valuable. Through education the general public can become more informed about responsible pet ownership and, in turn, reduce the number of

unwanted and abandoned cats and kittens

that are surrendered to welfare organizations. All of this would not be possible without the support of other staff members and volunteers who are more like friends than workmates. The emotional support that comes from these relationships helps her through the bad times that come from working in this industry.

Georgina's passion for animal welfare and long-standing commitment to CPS makes her an invaluable member of the team. Working at CPS can be a joyous experience, but it can also be overwhelmingly heartbreaking. Georgina brings light-heartedness and laughter to the workplace, and makes getting through the hard days much easier. She is not only a favourite of the staff, but also of all the volunteers. Georgina's popularity was very evident recently when her roster changed and one volunteer decided to come an extra day, just so she would still get an opportunity to work with Georgina.

Georgina and her partner Brenden are the proud parents of three cats - Jasmin, Indiana and her most recent arrival Dangermouse (all ex CPS, of course!!), and a staffy called Coco. She is a regular kitten foster carer, and has just started with WIRES to assist in the care of native wildlife. She is also currently studying Captive Animal husbandry at TAFE. For Georgina it seems, all aspects of her life are involved in the care of animals in need, and she wouldn't have it any other way!

Cats & Babies

ne of the times people surrender their cats is when they are expecting their first baby. Parents-to-be become anxious about problems that may occur and cats that have been part of the family for many years are rejected once the new baby arrives. It is often common myths and misinformation that influence people to make this decision. Preparing your cat for the new arrival and having a good understanding of potential health issues is the key to reducing anxiety for

you and your cat.

A concern for pregnant women is toxoplasmosis, which can cause problems with pregnancy. Only a small proportion of cats, about 0.01% will ever have toxoplasmosis so the risks are extremely low. People are more likely to get toxoplasmosis from eating undercooked meat or gardening than from contact with pet cats. (Cat Protection has a fact sheet on Toxoplasmosis if you require more information).

Ensuring that your cat is healthy and parasite free is essential for your own pet's health and means a more hygienic environment for your baby. Make sure your cat is up-to-date with vaccinations, flea and worming treatments and is desexed before he/she reaches four months. Ensure your cat's feeding area and litter tray is away from areas used to prepare food and encourage your cat to use a covered litter tray with a cat flap entrance. Always wash your hands after petting and cleaning litter trays, bedding and bowls. Any changes to your cat's routine should always be done gradually.

One of the most important steps is to familiarise your cat with the sights, sounds and smells the new baby will bring to the home. Set up the baby's room several weeks before the baby is due and allow your cat to explore the room before making it out of bounds. Let him sniff the cot and pram but teach him not to get inside. Once baby is born have your partner bring home bedding with the new baby's smell (before you return from the hospital) so your cat can become accustomed to the new scent. A lot of cats love wool and like to eat it, so keep shawls and blanket out of reach.

One of the great myths is that your cat will suffocate your baby while it is sleeping. ¹ Recent studies suggest that many of the cases where cats supposedly suffocated babies were mostly incidents of SIDS -

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. It is advisable though to keep the door closed to the baby's room when it is sleeping, checking the cat is not in the room beforehand. Alternatively you could also use crib nets or install a screen door. Putting screens on the windows in the baby's room will help stop unwanted feline intruders. A baby alarm or intercom will also help monitor the baby while it is sleeping.

Introducing your baby to your cat should also be done gradually. Allow your pet to gently investigate by sniffing, but do not allow licking. Speak to your cat in soothing tones for reassurance. It is best to start with a brief introduction at first then build up the duration as your pet becomes acquainted. Never leave a

baby or young children with your cat unsupervised. Children need to be educated on how to handle animals and require adult guidance and supervision. Your new baby will be your priority, but don't forget to give attention to your cat. Give your cat a special treat when you are feeding the baby or get your partner involved in play or petting.

Often families worry that their cat will become jealous of the new baby. Rather than becoming jealous (jealousy is a human emotion), animals interpret changes in their routine as threats. Your cat may show signs of "anxious" behaviour and become sullen and withdrawn or be more edgy or aggressive. Punishing your cat for a change in behaviour will only make things worse as physical punishment encourages aggression and sets a poor example of human-animal interaction for your children. Look out for the warning signs of anxious behaviour which include sudden shyness/hiding; aloof behaviour; toileting problems; excessive grooming; loss of appetite; increasing aggression towards people or other animals and decreasing interest in play. Consult your vet for advice if your cat exhibits these warning signs.

Remember, children and pets are good for each other. Children learn many valuable lessons from animals about responsibility, companionship, consideration for others and respect for animals. Adjustments always need to be made when the family grows. Don't forget that your cat is part of the family too!
