

Good news from the Federal Government who has finally recognized animal charities and changes to legislation has allowed animal welfare agencies to be eligible for tax deductibility status for donations. The Cat Protection Society has again applied for tax deductibility, and this time we expect to be successful and will inform members as soon as permission is granted. If we are successful the status may be backdated, so all donations over two dollars made as of 31 July 2006 will be tax deductible.

Society continues to operate as always, our main

concern being our furry friends and their welfare.

2005-2006 increased Cat Rehoming and Desexings

The good news is that we managed to rehome over 1400 cats and kittens. We also assisted in the desexing of over 3200 cats and kittens and by doing so helped to avoid the unwanted birth of tens of thousands of kittens.

and very loving.




Ask the Cattery Manager

I have just arrived from the UK and live close to your adoption centre in Enmore. I am in Australia for the next two years for work and I've had to leave my two beautiful eight year old cats with my mum. I know they're being very well cared for but I miss them terribly and I'm wondering whether you might have cats and/or kittens that need a temporary home while I'm here.

RACHEL PORTER, STANMORE.

The Cat Protection Society has a foster care program for orphaned kittens and mothers with their litters. During the breeding season, which is at its height in the warmer months of Spring and Summer, we look after countless numbers of abandoned cats and kittens. We have limited space to care for them in our cattery so we usually send them out to foster carers, sometimes for over two months at a time, until they are weaned and weigh enough to come back to the adoption centre for rehoming. The kittens need to weigh about one kilo to tolerate the anaesthetic safely, they are vaccinated and microchipped at the same time. They are then put up for adoption.



The Cat Protection Society supplies all the food, litter, bedding, toys and medications and a staff member is on call 24 hours a day to offer support and advice if there's an emergency.



The first eight weeks of a kittens life is very important for bonding with humans, one of the main duties of a foster carer is to spend as much time as possible playing and cuddling with their charges. This way, when they return for adoption, they'll be snapped up quickly because they're so friendly and purry.

We currently have a small team of foster carers but we desperately need more if we want to try to save all of the mums and kittens that are brought to us. Our current foster carers are some of the kindest people I've ever met, they give their time and their hearts so generously to the cats and kittens in their care. They're on the frontline helping to save lives and they all absolutely love it. The only negative for them is when the time comes to bring their foster families back and they don't want to let them go. Parting is such sweet sorrow, but we always have more cat families needing help so our carers are never lonely for long.

If you're interested in helping out with fostering be it a one off or an ongoing commitment, please contact the Cattery Manager as soon as possible. It won't be long before we're inundated again so get on board and help make a difference.

Summit to end Pet Overpopulation

National Desexing Network Animal Welfare League QLD

Gold Coast 14 June - 17 June 2006

Over 120 delegates from around Australia came together for the inaugural Summit to End Pet Overpopulation.

A detailed report on the proceedings and outcomes of the Summit are available on the National Desexing Network webpage www.ndn.org.au.

There was much discussion on many issues directly related to Cat Management and Cat Welfare; with this Summit being the first of it's kind for it's focus on cats.

The Summit was attended by a group of people from a wide range of animal welfare and related fields from Australia and New Zealand.

It was very encouraging to come together and talk about issues and challenges facing those who work in animal welfare. Many of the ideas that came out of the Summit were directly aligned to the work CPS is already undertaking and we came away with many more ideas for areas of improvement, and new concepts for us to think about.

The promotion of desexing and early age desexing was high on the list of topics for discussion. It was identified as an important area to work on to assist in decreasing the large number of unwanted pets in Australia.

Discount/free desexing services

Speakers from Spay USA from the US talked in depth about ways to maximise the use of discount vets for referral. There was also a discussion on the success of mobile desexing units.

Early Age Desexing

Dr Marvin Mackie from the US spoke about early age desexing. On the Thursday night there was debate over early age desexing. Importantly for CPS Dr Mackie spoke of how there is no evidence at all that early age desexing had any negative effects on cats.

Increasing adoptions

Lynne Fridley from Maddies Fund US, discussed ways to increase adoptions through welfare agencies. Some of the strategies discussed were in line with ones already in place at CPS.

- To increase attractiveness of facilities and animals to encourage clients to take cats
- To make sure staff have good Customer Service skills, and
- To increase transfers to other facilities
- Mobile adoptions, staff take animals to shopping centers and pet supply stores

Large adoption events

Microchipping

Marree Garrett from the Companion Animal Unit discussed the positive role microchipping has had on animal management in NSW.

Education Initiatives

Nicole Van Den Kuyt from the Bureau of Animal Welfare Vic presented education programs offered by the Vic. State government.

All the brochures and materials were very impressive and in particular one on cat proofing your yard. All materials are available through the Bureau.

Cat Crisis Coalition - VIC

Carol Webb, CPS Vic talked about the coming together of the Coalition in Victoria. One of the local Councils, Mornington, has embraced the concept and made desexing compulsory in their Council area.

Some of the key actions identified by the NDN at the end of the summit were as follows:

Key Actions needed to end the killing of unwanted cat and dog population:

- Relevant government bodies to introduce legislation for all cats and dogs to be desexed and microchipped prior to sale or exchange (unless to another registered breeder).
- 2. Comprehensive uniform statistics be required from all states, to include incoming and euthanased numbers from all pounds and shelters (perhaps driven by Aust Animal Welfare Strategy group). Other data requirements to be determined to identify and track sources of unwanted companion animals and target desexing and education programs to reduce numbers.
- 3. Funding for research, education and legislative initiatives to be addressed eg through Victorian DPI model of levies on registration.
- 4. National and state initiatives to develop understanding and training of veterinarians in early age desexing, including pilot projects and university vet courses.
- 5. Formation of a Policy Development Committee for the development of strategies for the humane management of unowned free-roaming cats.
- 6. A National Coalition of stakeholders be formed to pursue all of the above Summit resolutions.

Real Men Do Love Cats ats

he perception for a long time has been that cats are for women and dogs are for men. However, it is great to report that this cliché is slowly being whittled away. We are at last beginning to see that many men are becoming aware of the joys of sharing their life with a cat and they're not afraid to show it.

It seems that men who like cats are sometimes perceived as softies and there is an ill-founded idea that real men are not interested in cats, and in fact dislike them. At Cat Protection we are working hard to dispel these misconceptions and every day we witness great examples of Australian men loving and respecting cats and enjoying interacting with them.

Interestingly, how men relate to cats is a good indication as to how they relate to women in general. Men who do not like cats, tend to be overbearing and controlling in their household.

More Australians, and especially men, are realising that responsible cat ownership (keeping cats indoors or at the least curfewing from dusk till dawn) can be an extremely rewarding experience. Men that have already admitted a soft spot for their felines agree that it's great to have a happy kitty greet you at the door, rubbing against you and meowing with delight. A man can relish this homecoming and still knock back a cold one later on while watching the footy. This swing towards cats is being seen in the UK as well.

The following excerpts were taken from a British study:

It seems single men are discovering what single women have known since ancient Egyptian times: Cats are worthy of worship! At least unmarried British men say so. In a recent survey conducted by Cats Protection (a leading animal welfare society in the UK) the survey showed:

 85 percent of men, and 94 percent of women, don't think it's wimpy or needy for a man to love his cat.

- Men are more likely than women to regard their cat as a good friend.
- Single male Londoners enjoy lavishing care on their cat just as much as women do.


The benefits of adopting a cat are many. There is the unconditional-love, the way science has proved that stress levels come down drastically when one is stroking a pet, etc. But here's additional incentive: Men with cats are babe magnets. Yes, according to this same British survey, women love men with cats. Ninety percent of single women surveyed thought men who like cats are "nicer" - i.e., more caring and sensitive - than those who don't.

Below are a couple of examples of men who have embraced cat ownership, and wouldn't have it any other way.

Real Men Do Love Cats
