In fact, by law we cannot be paid for our services. Being on the Council requires a serious commitment of time and effort but the reward is knowing that we're building solid foundations for the future of cat protection in NSW.

Without volunteers, CPS wouldn't be here today. Volunteers run the Op Shop; foster kittens; help with cleaning the cattery and feeding the cats; assist with administration and marketing; serve on the Council ... and give vital love and attention to our resident felines.

Cats scratch for a number of reasons. First, they are marking their territory. Cats have scent glands in their pads on their feet so every time they scratch the furniture it leaves a smell to say they have been there. It is also to leave a mark. Scratch marks let another cat know they have been there, so watch out! You may notice your cat scratches the furniture more when a stranger visits or they notice a cat in their yard. They are just re-establishing their territory.

Cats also need to maintain their nails. Contrary to popular belief your cat is *not* sharpening his nails; instead he is helping to break away any dead nail that may be loose. Every four to six weeks your cat's nails will shed.

The dead part of the nail will fall away and the new nail will be underneath. Sometimes the dead nail needs help to come away from the new nail, hence your cat scratching.

How to stop it

All cats need somewhere to scratch. Provide a few scratching posts and if they try to scratch your furniture, pick the cat up and place them at the scratch post. Spraying some aerosol catnip on the scratch posts can help to make them more attractive. You can also trim your cat's nails. This will not stop the scratching but it will minimise the damage they do as the nail will be blunt. You will need to do this on a weekly basis as they will get sharp again quickly. Only ever cut the sharp tip off the nail, as cutting too far

down can cause the nail to bleed. If in doubt, ask your vet to do it for you.

You can also try a water pistol. Any time your cat scratches the furniture, spray a quick jet at their paws with the water pistol. After a few times, they should start going to the scratch post. There are deterrents available from pet shops and vets. These are usually sprayed directly onto the furniture and when the cat scratches, release a scent your cat doesn't like. Of course, be careful that the spray doesn't cause even more damage to your furniture.

Remember, perseverance is the key. Your cat is only acting on natural impulses and doesn't realise your furniture is different from a scratch post or a tree!







Stray Cats of Turkey

Turkey is 99 per cent Muslim. The founder of the Muslim religion, the Prophet Mohammed, loved cats. The 'M' marking on the tabby forehead is believed to be the mark of the Prophet.

I have never seen so many stray cats in any country I have visited, like I have in Turkey. I covered 3,500 kilometres and every town and city had its strays to greet me. I never saw rodents and could count on one hand the dogs I saw.

'Our cats are all strays,' a shop owner told me, in the beautiful Mediterranean coastal town of Kas. His shop had an animal donation box. 'We desex as many cats as we can afford to,' he added.

Most cats are well-fed by restaurants, locals and tourists. You can't be seated outside most restaurants without at least one cat greeting you for food. I noticed



how much friendlier these cats are compared to our stray cats in Sydney. On the streets and bazaars, they co-exist with humans and usually have their litters behind shops — I even witnessed week-old kittens under shop steps in an Istanbul bazaar, totally undisturbed by people.

Many shop owners grow to love their strays and care for them. I was told, happily, by a carpet seller, 'Two of my cats, Americans took to their country.' The stray he considers his own was enjoying a nap on his rugs (see picture).

Of course, when there are too many strays there must be some control on their numbers and I didn't ask how; I can only guess by the lack of veterinary clinics.

Not all strays looked healthy and I came across sickly and injured cats I was hopeless to help.

One tourist observing me said, 'You would find no peace if you remained in Turkey with all these strays.' I believe she spoke for all true cat lovers with that comment.

I returned to my six gorgeous spoilt brats back home (all originally strays) who disliked being locked in their home and enclosure with their creature comforts. At least they showed they missed me after one month!



According to the World Society for the Protection of Animals (WSPA) there are about 600 million cats and a similar number of dogs in the world, of which an estimated 80% are stray and unwanted. The welfare issues for stray cats and dogs are many and include hunger, disease, traffic accidents and abuse. WSPA works to reduce the suffering of stray animals through its Stray Control projects, which include sterilisation and rabies vaccination programs. Free to good home

How many times have you seen flyers or newspaper ads promoting 'free' kittens? Sadly, too many people don't desex their cats and then hope that by giving away the resulting offspring the problem is solved. WRONG!

Every year in New South Wales alone there are thousands and thousands more kittens than there are good homes for them. The abandonment and destruction of innocent lives *must* end and the only realistic long-term solution is the desexing of all pet cats prior to sexual maturity.

In July, CPS members alerted us to a story in their local newspaper about a woman with more cats than she could care for. We were able to contact her and help her by taking the kittens for rehoming and desexing all the cats she was keeping. With CPS members and staff working together with the community, we can make a difference to cat welfare and wellbeing.

You can help solve feline overpopulation.

When you see an ad or hear about someone offering 'free to good to home' kittens, phone them and tell them about the Cat Protection Society's discount desexing program. Give them our phone number – 9519 7201 – and tell them to call us for assistance or referral with desexing their cat.

Encourage them to surrender the kittens to a shelter like CPS where they will be desexed before being rehomed. Let them know that tens of thousands of cats and kittens are euthanased every year because there are just too many kittens and not enough homes. Let them know that they can be a part of the solution, not the problem.



We've also had comments and letters published in local and even interstate media – flying the flag for CPS wherever we can!

We're delighted too, that Yianni's City Life, an independent magazine-style tv program that screens on community television, will be doing their second story for 2007 about Cat Protection! Thank you to Yianni for his love of cats.

School's in

At CPS, we've always been concerned with educating the community on responsible cat care. This year we've joined with the RSPCA in their primary school education program. The 'prevent a bite' program, mainly focused on educating kids how to avoid dog bites, had been running in schools for a couple of years when a number of shocking kitten cruelty cases highlighted the need for humane education.

When the RSPCA asked us if we'd be interested in helping them promote a new 'cats are cool' section to their program, how could we refuse? The new content promotes cat care and tries to dispel myths such as 'cats are for girls'.

Cat Tales teaches kids about the history of cats and how they have adapted from prehistoric to modern times. The program also helps children better understand charities, animal welfare issues generally, and how they can promote awareness in their school or community.

Nerida Atkin, our education officer, gave CPS's first presentation to Australia Street Infants School in Newtown. All the kids loved it, and especially liked 'Max' and 'Minty', our dog and cat friends who help with the presentation. Nestlé caring for cats

Some of you may have seen an advertisement for Nestlé Nesquik Plus in which a kitten turned into a tiger after drinking some chocolate milk. Cat Protection wrote to Nestlé expressing concern that such a product was not suitable for cats, and that while it may be clear to adults that the image was a fantasy and metaphor, there was a risk that children would emulate the little girl in the ad and feed their cats chocolate milk.

We're pleased to advise that

Nestlé's response was swift and positive. They voluntarily withdrew the ad and informed us: "We can assure you that we did not intend to harm or promote the harm of any animals with this communication ... We are aware that the petcare industry has worked very hard to educate pet owners on what food and drinks are suitable for pets and we do not want to undermine this in any way."

What makes Oscar worthy of note in an important medical journal is his ability to predict death.

In the essay, Oscar is described visiting various patients, appearing to check up on them, and then, when arriving at the bed of Mrs K, deciding to curl up beside her. When a nurse notes that Oscar is still there one hour later: 'She grabs Mrs K's chart off the medical records rack and begins to make phone calls.

'Within a half hour the family starts to arrive... relatives begin their vigil. The priest is called to deliver last rites. And still, Oscar has not budged, instead purring and gently nuzzling Mrs K. A young grandson asks his mother, "What is the cat doing here?" The mother, fighting back tears, tells him, "He is here to help Grandma get to heaven." Thirty minutes later, Mrs K takes her last earthly breath. With this, Oscar sits up, looks around, then departs the room so quietly that the grieving family barely notices.'

It is reported that Oscar has presided over the deaths of more than 25 residents.

His gift gives nursing staff time to notify families and his sensitivity and warmth give companionship and comfort to the dying.
