

Council Report

Our Spring 2009 covergirl, Tinkerbell, found a loving and understanding home in February. Some of you will be familiar with her story. Her beloved person died suddenly and Tinkerbell came to us very distraught, and then we discovered she had early signs of skin cancer so she had to have surgery on her ears. As a deaf cat, she needed an exceptionally sensitive family who would work with her special needs.

We all celebrated when she found that family some seven months after her arrival here. Hundreds of cats and kittens had come and gone to forever homes in that period and we were happy for them all, but there is something extra heart-warming when cats with extra special needs find homes.

It is one of the things that makes Cat Protection unique, that we will work with, take the time and invest the money needed to help cats with special needs. Around Christmas time, Brock – a three-year old black and white stray lucky enough to have been brought to Cat Protection – was found to have a 10cm hernia. A few more months of street life would have meant a slow and painful death for Brock. Instead, thanks to our donors, the kind person who rescued him and the team at the Sydney University Vet Hospital, he had surgery, six weeks cage rest, and is now a healthy, happy cat enjoying the company of fellow felines in our rehoming centre.

These two cats aren't the only happy stories of the New Year – we've already rehomed more than 200 cats and kittens.

Perhaps because it is a cat year – Year of the Tiger – that we have had an auspicious beginning to 2010. Sadly, there are fewer than 3,500 tigers left in the wild. Helping our cats' big cousins is WWF, whose goal is to more than double the wild tiger population by the next Year of the Tiger in 2022.

It is said that the tiger is a fearless creature and so represents a year when people will be more optimistic and courageous. We certainly feel that way. We are working on an exciting new project with the Australian Government, have had constructive dialogue with the NSW Government and already have a number of cat welfare programs planned with a number of local councils.

To all our friends, Kung Hei Fat Choy! May 2010 bring good things to all cats, big and small.



Feline Immunodeficiency Virus

While studies show FIV is significantly more prevalent in populations of unowned cats than in owned cats, cats who are indoors/outdoors are also at risk, with males being most at risk. Indoor-only cats free from the virus are at virtually no risk.

What is it?

Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (also known as Feline Aids) attacks a cat's T-cells. These cells are important in helping the body fight off disease. Once the T-cells start to decline in the body the cat is open to secondary infections. FIV cannot be transmitted to humans from cats.

FIV is present in the saliva of infected cats and the main route of transmission is by bite wounds. Adult undesexed male freeroaming cats are the highest risk group for infection of the virus — and contact with those cats puts other cats at high risk.

Prevention is best

The single most effective way to prevent FIV in your cats is to keep them indoors at all times, or indoors with strictly supervised outdoor times in a secure yard.

If your cats are allowed outside, try to cat-proof fence your yard so that other cats cannot enter the property and your cat cannot leave it.

Ensure your cat is desexed as this will reduce the risk of your cat getting into fights and always curfew your cat indoors at night.

These strategies will also prevent your cat from contracting many other diseases that can be carried by stray or neighbouring cats.

Vaccines are available but they do not guarantee immunity. You will need to specially request this vaccination as it is not a part of the standard F3 vaccination schedule. Decisions about vaccination should always be made in consultation with your vet.

What are the symptoms?

FIV can go undetected in cats for a long time, until secondary infections occur. Some signs that may indicate FIV are:

- Lethargy
- Weight loss
- Loss of appetite
- · Swollen lymph glands
- · Gum disease
- Diarrhoea
- Skin infections
- · Respiratory infections
- · Urinary infections.

If your cat has any of these symptoms, you should consult your vet immediately.

Your vet can do a simple blood test to check whether your cat has FIV. However, if your cat has been previously vaccinated against FIV, then the cat might test positive owing to the presence of the vaccine rather than the actual virus. If you don't know the full history of your cat, it can be difficult to determine whether the test is actually positive or a false positive. A series of tests might be required.

What do I do if my cat has FIV?



Although cats with FIV can live long and happy lives, it is extremely important that they are not allowed to go outside or be in contact with other cats.

If your cat has FIV you will need to:

- Keep your cat indoors to prevent them infecting other cats and also to protect them from other diseases. With a compromised immune system, even a common condition such as cat flu can be fatal
- Don't feed your cat raw meat or chicken
- Feed a nutritionally complete and balanced diet
- Take them for regular checkups with your vet
- If you have any other cats you will need to have them tested. If they do not have FIV, you will need to consider whether to keep them separate from the cat with FIV. Separating them will prevent transmission of FIV from the infected cat, however, if the cats are strongly bonded such a decision may be contrary to the welfare needs of the cats. You will need to discuss the situation in depth with your vet and understand all the risks before making a decision
 - · Ensure the cat is desexed
- Be prepared. Keep an eye on your cat's eating and toileting habits, as well as looking out for signs of illness. As the cat's immune system is poor, they can become ill very easily.

FIV is a very serious condition with health impacts for the wider feline population.

Careful and close management is essential to mitigating the risk and spread of FIV. If you think your cat might have been exposed to an infected cat or you have any concerns that your cat might have FIV please see your vet immediately.

Don't buy fur products

Following our article on testing on animals, a member reminded us that many products with fur (including cat toys) might be cat fur. Although imports of cat fur to Australia are illegal, there are many products of dubious origin to be found in markets and other places. We don't sell any items with fur and suggest that members also avoid such products.

Is your cat's microchip

Is your cat's microchip valid? The NSW Companion Animals Register has been in operation since July 1999. However, many cats (including cats adopted from Cat Protection) microchipped before then might not have their details recorded on the Register (even if you did register them).

If your cat was microchipped and registered before July 1999, it is well worth checking whether their details are recorded. You can ask your vet to do this (most vets have access to the Register). We can also do this for you. even if you have lost the original microchip paperwork. We can scan the cat and check whether or not they are registered, and register them if they are not. A limited number of staff are authorised to access the Register and to amend microchip records, so you must make an appointment first. Please call our office on 9519 7201 Monday to Friday between 9am and 4pm. Thank you, Dot, for this important reminder to all Cat Protection members.

Both Buckley and Little Puss recently celebrated their first


birthdays (both in September!). I bought two very cute matching collars – pink for Little Puss, and blue for Buckley. This should help you tell them apart in the photos.

We could not be happier; she has such a lovely personality. Thank you very much for the great work that you do.



IN MEMORIAM

Professor Charles Birch AM 1918-2009

It was with deep sadness that we learned of the passing of Professor Birch, a former Patron of the Cat Protection Society of NSW.

In 2008, our Golden Anniversary year, we were honoured to host a visit from Professor Birch and he was delighted to see the work of Cat Protection first hand again. As he admired the cats in our care, he recounted stories about his feline friend at home.

In his obituary, the *Sydney Morning Herald* (December 23-24 2009) described Professor Birch as 'A man of science and religion ... [who] started out as an agricultural scientist, switched to biology and ecology and soon confronted questions that were to occupy him for the rest of his life: where humankind was really going, preoccupied as it was with its eternal conflicts and relentless pursuit of wealth'.

In 1990, Professor Birch won the Templeton Prize for science and religion. Among other awards and honours, he was a fellow of the Australian Academy of Science and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and in 2008 he became a Member of the Order of Australia for service to science, particularly in the field of biology as an academic and researcher, and through contributions to the understanding of the relationship of science to religion.

And he was, of course, a great friend to cats and those who cared for them. With grace and affection, we will always remember his support of the Cat Protection Society and his love for cats.

A unique way to remember your cat

People donating \$5,000 to the Cat Protection Society have the option of taking home a steel cat from our sculpture, *The Dream* (in which case, \$4,780 of the donation is tax deductible). *The Dream* was created by acclaimed Sydney artist Michael Snape, and comprises a colony of more than 100 stainless steel cat silhouettes in a variety of poses – sleeping, stretching, pouncing, dreaming – waiting to be taken to a new home. As each steel cat is 'adopted' and removed from the sculpture, their shadow cat is revealed and the artwork takes on a new form.

Donors' names and dedications are recorded in frames situated near the sculpture. It is a unique and permanent way to remember a much-loved cat. Donors take home a beautiful steel sculpture cat and a dedication is recorded at the Cat Protection Society. As well, the donation will provide Cat Protection with the funds needed to provide shelter, desexing, veterinary treatment and loving care for up to 10 real cats and kittens until they realise their dream of a loving and responsible home. What more fitting tribute to a cat's life than to save the lives of others?
