# **President's Report**

Many changes are underway in the world of charities and animal welfare. The new Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC) has been established by the federal government to streamline regulation of the sector – a welcome move that will improve transparency and accountability, and also provide clearer guidance to the sector.

The NSW Government has released the discussion paper of the Companion Animals Taskforce (of which Cat Protection is a member). The paper canvasses wide-ranging reforms and submissions will be accepted until 1 July. We encourage members to participate in this important initiative for animal welfare.

As you may know, we are a relatively small charity. To put that in some context, our entire annual operating budget is less than the NSW RSPCA spends each year on fundraising. However, we have the same accountability obligations as any large charity. At Cat Protection, we are constantly mindful of the need to focus our funds and attention on our core business of caring for cats but we cannot neglect our legal obligations, we have to invest in good business practices, and we have to participate in and understand the 'big picture' of animal (feline) welfare.

Our Board closely examines our expenditure throughout the year and we are satisfied that Cat Protection's core charitable purpose of caring for cats is not just constantly met, but achieved effectively and efficiently. In every issue of *Cat Affairs* you can see just some of the cats for whom we have found loving and responsible homes.

What you may not see, but which is just as significant, is the outcomes for the cats of people we have helped; for example, when we have assisted people in rental and strata situations to keep their cat. Every cat who stays with their owner is one less cat in a pound or shelter.

We give advice to people from all over NSW to help them manage their cats' health or behavioural problems – problems that are often putting the cats at risk of surrender. Our discount desexing program ensures more and more cats in the community will not contribute to feline overpopulation. We provide assistance where we can to human health services to help their clients with their cats – whether by donating cat food, providing advice, desexing, or rehoming cats from situations at risk of domestic squalor.

We also contribute to public policy affecting cats and people: our work on community care and cats, pet-friendly accommodation and the Companion Animals Taskforce are just some examples. And of course, we've reunited lost cats with their people and we give advice on finding lost cats. Finally, we provide free information on our website that helps people solve their cat problems themselves.

For every cat we rehome from our shelter, there are at least another five we assist who aren't in our physical care. It's a huge achievement for a small charity, and one of which we are very proud. We hope that you will continue to support our efforts.

# Senior ca

Only time and patience can grow you a garden or an old friend. Our feline friends are maturing and ageing more gracefully than they used to, due to good food, good owners and timely veterinary intervention.

A cat at 13 years old is metabolically the same as a 70 year old person, and by 19 they are in their feline 90s! As with our seniors and their doctors, routine check-ups of your venerable feline friend will pick up problems early, be less costly to treat, and maximise their time with you. If you want your familiar feline family member to be with you, comfortably, for as long as possible, then "A visit to the vet in time – saves Nine – lives"!

The big three issues for our senior felines are arthritis, dental disease and kidney function.

### **Arthritis**

We used to think that cats did not get arthritis, and that slowing down was just a function of growing old. Now we know that 90 per cent of cats over the age of 10 years have arthritis (in fact, 30 per cent of cats over 3 years old have it!) and we all appreciate that chronic pain is debilitating. The good news is that there are now some great ways to alleviate that pain and your oldie will even start playing again! If you feline friend (of any age) is not able to jump up on your kitchen bench easily (or over the garden fence) then think about addressing their pain.

Acupuncture. It is actually called Aquapuncture because under sedation / pain relief, the vet injects Vitamin B12 into the Acupuncture Points. It means your cat only has one visit, is pretty immediately free of pain, and the results usually last one to two years. Eighty per cent of the cats treated have done extremely well. In addition, there are Omega-3 supplements (Feline Omega-Joint), a special Feline Joint Diet (from Hill's), Deer Velvet tablets, Green Lip Mussel supplements, safe pain relieving drugs, and a course of injections (Pentosan Polysulfate - originally developed for racehorses but cats benefit as well). The NSAID drug Meloxicam has recently been shown to not only alleviate arthritis pain, but also to extend the functional life of kidneys - Clever Cats!

### **Dental disease**

Dental deterioration is the next chronic problem our feline friends have - basically because they don't brush their teeth, fluoride does not help them, and only catching and eating mice is preventative. Because those germs in the mouth affect a cat's whole body, dental disease puts pressure on the immune system and the kidneys in particular, plus



bad teeth are sore. Major dental work involves removing those teeth before the root abscesses cause bigger problems. The canines or long front teeth should remain as long as possible for face shape and self-defence, but removing all the back teeth results in longer kidney life, reduced pain and much better breath!

Human periodontists have proved that taking out all the teeth of homeless people results in a lot fewer trips to hospital, and much better heart health (the human weak point). Cats are just as keen to stay away from hospital, and a 'caudal clearance' helps them to do that. There is no proven benefit to just polishing cat's teeth - and even if you brush them afterwards, they are just not designed to last. And even cats with no back teeth can still CATch rats and mice - they just can't peel them!

### **Kidneys**

Kidneys are a cat's weak point. Fifty per cent of cats die of kidney failure and the other half from cancer (with only a few expiring from heart problems and other metabolic disturbances). Now that there is so much more we can do to help keep feline kidneys functioning for longer, the cats just keep on going!



Kidney function should be regularly checked with urine tests and blood pressure measurements (yes, feline and canine blood pressure can be assessed with paediatric cuffs and a special doppler machine). The procedures are painless – the cats think it is strange but they rarely object. They must know it is for their own good.

Managing blood pressure with drugs, and changing the diet to help the kidneys function better, has resulted in many venerable souls living a very high quality of life for many extra years. The use of prescription renal diets, plus the supplement lpakatine (for the 'non-renal' meals) means cats can have their favourite food AND stabilise their kidney's workload! Omega-3 supplements and other anti-oxidant additives in the senior diets do make a difference over the long term.

For the chronic kidney and bladder infections that are common in the elderly of all species, the long-acting (14 day) antibiotic injection (ConveniaR) is a godsend for felines – pretty effective and only one or two trips to the vet – not daily pills. With a combination of these things, plus controlling blood pressure (with the same medications as people take), kidney function can be extended to nearly match that of a kidney transplant. Now THAT'S something!

### Diabetes and hyperthyroidism

These are the two other common, but manageable diseases of elderly cats. Urine and blood tests can identify them, and there are a range of treatments – varying from the 'Catkins' diet for the diabetic feline (increased protein, eliminate most carbs) to the radioactive lodine treatment that is the same as you would have if your thyroid became overactive.

### Cancer

There are as many kinds of cancers in cats as there are in humans. Early desexing almost eliminates mammary and prostate cancer (think about that for a minute), but almost every other kind has been found to occur. Few are amenable to cure, some can be managed with drugs of varying toxicity.

Just because a cancer is found (and they are usually malignant and on the inside of the cat, so hidden from detection) does not mean it has to be treated. Their cancers seem to be less painful – a cat will stop eating if in pain or nauseous, so while your cat is happy and interactive, the time you have after a 'terminal diagnosis' is yours to enjoy with your feline companion.

And sometimes the toughest question when you have a feline friend (whether for a long time or not): when is enough, enough? The final parting is so hard and you can never be ready to let your feline friend go. Sometimes, you just have to know that tomorrow is not going to be any better, and make the brave decision to euthanase. Sometimes, in the end, you can only prevent suffering, and that is the greatest gift.



Dr Kim Kendall is a specialist in feline medicine and animal behaviour based in Chatswood. She graduated and started her own cats-only clinic in Sydney last century and has spent years developing expertise in primary care cat medicine, and collating cat-related information for clinical and behavioural interventions.

In her practice particularly, she has discovered that the well-fed, contained cat can be contented and healthy enough to live a life long enough to require geriatric juggling of multiple medical issues.

She tells us that: "In order for the urban feline to live long enough, the owners of the cats must oftentimes be counselled as to the reasonable expectations they can have of their feline friend. This is where the mind matters to the medicine. Yes, cats do get psychosomatic illnesses. Yes, they are smart enough to need anti-depressants."

Dr Kendall does regular annual Senior Health Check weeks – usually the last week of August – where she does a full health check plus urine and blood pressure tests at a discounted rate. Go to www. catclinic.com.au or phone 1800 CAT VET.

### Companion Animals – have your say!

The NSW Government has released the Companion Animals Taskforce discussion paper and submissions will be accepted until 1 July 2012.

We urge everyone who cares about animal welfare to consider this report and take the time to give feedback – our animal friends need you to speak up for them.

We congratulate the Minister for Local Government, the Hon Don Page, and the Minister for Primary Industries, the Hon Katrina Hodgkinson, for establishing the Taskforce, and also the Member for Charlestown, veterinarian Andrew Cornwell, for his work as Chairman.

The Taskforce discussion paper covers a wide range of measures that aim to reduce the current rate of euthanasia for cats and dogs; refine the current regulatory framework around the breeding and sale of cats and dogs to improve welfare outcomes; and to promote socially responsible pet ownership. As a member of the Taskforce, Cat Protection can attest to the level of work that has gone into developing this discussion paper and we encourage all members to get involved in this important opportunity to inform public policy.

Close to the heart of Cat Protection is consideration of proposals that would make more rental and strata accommodation 'pet-friendly'. There is a shortage of pet-friendly accommodation and we see Sydney's feline victims of this every week. It is heartbreaking for the cats and their people, and there are many sensible options that could change this situation without negatively affecting landlords or neighbours.

The issues of companion animal welfare are complex. Cats and dogs are a part of human life, so considering their needs also requires consideration of human behaviour – hence education and information are very important.

We will be holding two consultation sessions for members on the discussion paper. Each session will be the same, just running at different times:

- Thursday, 14 June at 6.30pm 8pm
- Monday, 18 June at 3pm 4.30pm

These will be held at Cat Protection at 103 Enmore Road, Newtown. **Bookings are essential** – please phone 9519 7201 between 9am and 4pm Monday to Friday and let us know which session time you prefer. You do not need to attend to make a submission to the inquiry.

Wouldn't it be fantastic if we had more pet-friendly accommodation? How many unplanned litters of kittens would be prevented if there was an incentive for early-age desexing? Think of the benefits of broader education and information on socially responsible pet ownership, and what could be achieved with greater collaboration between councils and animal welfare organisations. Do you want to support steps to curb puppy farming?

Don't just wish, act! Please participate in this important initiative to bring about better outcomes for cats and dogs in NSW.


Thank you to all the kind people who donate goods to our Op Shop, to the volunteers who look after the shop and of course, our customers.





We absolutely adore the new addition to the family! Pepsi-Max is such a fun-loving, mischievous, affectionate kitten and is very well cared for and loved in his new home.




### Hello


### **Dear CPS**
