

Skin diseases in cats

The skin is the biggest organ of the feline body. The skin is composed of layers of cells, creating a relatively watertight barrier. Hair and natural surface chemicals help prevent foreign material and organisms from irritating the skin. There is also a population of normal bacteria that live on the skin, that help to keep everything in balance. It is when there is a change in these surface protective mechanisms that inflammation or infection of skin can occur.

There is often an increase in cats visiting the vets for skin disease during spring and summer. This is reflective of the changing environment at this time of year - the days are hotter and more humid, there are increased pollens in the air and new plants growing outside.

Common signs of skin problems include:

- Itching, licking or chewing at the coat and skin or over-grooming
- Red skin, inflammation or rashes
- Scabs, flaking skin or raised lumps and bumps
- Distinct or 'moth eaten' areas of hair loss
- Pus or blood draining from wounds on the skin.

Common causes of skin disease

All pets have the potential to be seriously impacted by **fleas**. Fleas are a parasite that exist in the environment, and develop through several stages before they are able to infect your cat. When an adult flea bites your cat, their saliva causes a local inflammation. Sometimes, cats have a low tolerance to flea saliva and develop a widespread reaction. This usually presents as an irritation or a rash in warm areas, such as the chin, base of tail or body. Some cats will be exceptionally itchy when they have fleas, while others appear relatively comfortable. As cats are such fantastic groomers, they can usually clear away the fleas. However, sometimes you will be able to find 'evidence' - tiny black specks of flea dirt (eggs and droppings) in their coat.

Feline ringworm can present in a similar manner to flea hypersensitivity. This is a contagious disease that is transmitted through fungal spores from cat to cat, and cat to human, in close confines. The affected area is a hairless and often scaly patch of skin with inflammation. While the extremities are most commonly affected (ears, paws, head) ringworm can occur on any part of the body.

Bacterial and yeast skin infections also increase during the spring and summer. Micro-organisms that live on the skin cause the majority of these infections, and added moisture or surface irritation allows the bacteria to multiply. Surface bacterial infections can



occur anywhere - even between the toes - and can be quite troubling for our four-legged friends.

Some cats can develop skin disease in response to things seemingly unrelated to their skin - including certain plants and grasses, different types of material and bedding or even food! These are classed as hypersensitivities. The immune system recognises these as foreign, and affected animals can develop any of the common signs seen with skin disease. Some cats may also over-groom when they become stressed, and develop areas of patchy, saliva-stained coat and red skin. They can develop secondary bacterial infections in these regions.

A less common, unusually unseasonal, skin disease is called eosinophilic granulomatous complex. This is a group of several syndromes that can present as a single, ulcerated raised lesion, a lump or ulceration on the chin or lips, or as widespread irritation across the skin. There can be a range of causes for this complex, including parasites (including fleas and mosquitoes), an allergic reaction, certain diets or a genetic predisposition.

In some unusual cases, cats can have autoimmune skin diseases, where cells in their body attack normal cells. These types of skin diseases usually occur at areas where the skin changes in composition – from the gum to the skin on the mouth, or the paw pad to the paw. Cats can also develop a range of benign and malignant tumors on their skin that may require further investigation.

It is important to visit the vet as soon as you recognise any change in your cat's skin or grooming behaviour.

Tools used to diagnose skin disease include:

- History diet, cats environment, parasite control, bedding
- Physical examination

- Skin samples skin scrapings, skin tape preparations and surface smears, to help assess the type of cells present and whether there is an overgrowth of yeast or bacteria. Sometimes your vet may ask permission to do a bacterial culture and sensitivity, where they collect a sample from the skin and send it to the laboratory in an attempt to grow and isolate bacteria. They can then determine what antibiotics are effective against the implicated bacteria
- Individual hair examination and culture
- Skin biopsies
- Blood tests to evaluate overall health
- Food or allergy testing and exclusion.

How do I prevent skin disease in my cats?

- Parasite control: protecting your cats with an appropriate parasite control product is crucial to minimise the risk of parasite related skin disease. There is a range of topical and oral products available
- Provide a clean environment for your cat: regularly wash their bedding and clean and vacuum your home
- Regularly groom your cat. If you choose to wash your cat, do so with a cat approved product, purchased from your veterinarian. Human, and some dog products, can be irritating to cats so it is important to read the fine print
- Feed your cat a healthy, balanced diet.

Help! My cat has fleas! What should I do?

Step 1: Relax!

 Fleas are sneaky little parasites and can be a challenge to get rid of. Approaching the situation with a clear headspace is crucial for success

Step 2: Manage the flea population on your cat

 I usually recommend a combination of a fast acting product in addition to amfortnightly to monthly flea product

Step 3: Manage the flea population on all your other animals at home

 If your cat has fleas, chances are your other pets (dogs, cats, bunnies) do as well. It is crucial to use appropriate flea control on other pets, as they could act as a continual food source to the flea population. Ask your veterinarian for appropriate flea control for your pets

Step 4: Manage the population in your home environment

- This is one of the most critical steps, as over 80 per cent of the flea population is not on our pets
- All bedding must be washed in a hot cycle and left outside to dry. This is crucial as the UV light

- helps to kill immature flea stages in the bedding
- Vacuum your home regularly, sometimes daily with severe infections. Vibrations trigger the pupae, immature fleas, to emerge, and subsequently be inhaled by the vacuum cleaner.

Treating skin disease

If your vet diagnoses a skin disease in your cat, a range of different treatments may be required. Your veterinarian will help to tailor the treatment plan for you and your cat, and it may include an antibiotic, steroids, a topical cream or solution, parasite control or natural products including fatty acids. There is a range of balanced, low allergen diets for cats prone to skin disease from certain dietary proteins.




Our new family member, Loki (named after the Norse god of mischief) is doing very well. He is appropriately named, and enjoys making mischief!

Apollo was adopted from the Cat Protection Society in June 2015. He came to us after being brought in as a friendly stray with his brother and sister.


The day we found him he had just seen his brother and sister go off to another home. He was very little and didn't like to be held much. He weighed about 1.23kgs and had a darker grey colour.


