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President's Report

Earlier this month I had the pleasure of chairing our AGM and being able to look back on a great year for Cat Protection. We reported a record net surplus of \$4,655,675, made possible by bequest income of \$5,579,214, most of which came from two exceptionally generous individuals, the late Mabs Melville and the late June Bullock.

Our annual report is available on our website for anyone who'd like to look at the details. We are very effective in managing our finances and the fact that we once again received an unqualified audit attests to this. This is no mean feat when you consider the complexity of our organisation.

Those who attended the AGM were able to join me in thanking the team - both staff and volunteers - for a job well done. We rehomed 812 felines (199 adult cats and 613 kittens); assisted with the desexing of 1,871 cats in the community and reunited five lost cats and two lost dogs with their people; assisted more than 5,000 clients in person and helped countless more with the cat care information freely available on our website

With such significant and generous bequests comes enormous responsibilities for us to use the funds effectively in pursuing our aims. The challenge is finding the right balance between expenditure on mission and keeping funds in reserve to ensure a sustainable future.

Our approach is to maintain our existing operations while introducing new high-impact programs that will yield great results with short-term investment. It is vital that we keep sufficient reserves to ensure we can continue our work in the absence of major bequest income; there will be times when we need these reserves to operate all our programs.

Our history shows we are not afraid of a challenge but we want to be here for cats in the long run, so any extra spending needs to be carefully considered with all new initiatives properly planned and resourced.

All in all, I think we are very well positioned for the future. Last year was a year of transition that sets us up to tackle even greater challenges over the next few years. I only have to look out to my deck, where my tabby Hana is asleep in the sun, to know how rewarding and important that work will be.

Cat myths: fact or fiction?

The theme for Cat Protection's Open Day this year was "Cat Myths Busted". We were privileged to have Dr David Hughes from Concord Veterinary Hospital come along for the day and discuss what's true and what's false in the things people say about cats. Here, Dr Hughes shares with us some of the most common feline myths that are still doing the rounds today.

Cats should drink milk

This is still probably the most common cat myth – cats (and kittens) should drink cow's milk. This is definitely not true and in many cases giving cow's milk to cats and kittens can make them very unwell. The majority of cats are lactose intolerant and giving them milk can cause gastric upset (vomiting, diarrhoea) and in kittens, this can lead to severe dehydration and even death in extreme cases. Commercial pet milk (eg Whiskas Cat Milk) is simply lactose-free milk and offers no nutritional benefit to your cat. It can be given occasionally as a treat – but good old fashioned tap water is the best thing for your cat to drink.

We're often asked "what about yoghurt?" In small amounts (such as a teaspoon) natural, unflavoured yoghurt is unlikely to hurt your cat, and in some cases may be beneficial. It's best to check with your cat's regular veterinarian.

Pregnant women should not handle cats

This myth arises from the fact that cats can carry a parasite called *Toxoplasma*. If you are in the first trimester of your pregnancy, and you contract *Toxoplasma* your baby can be born with severe neurological, liver and eye damage which is permanent and crippling to your baby. It is true that cats can carry and therefore transmit this parasite to humans – however, it is not that simple! To contract toxoplasmosis from your cat all of the following need to occur:

- · Your cat needs to defecate
- Your cat's faeces needs to sit at room temperature for 24 hours (for the *Toxoplasma* eggs to become infectious to humans)
- You need to ingest some of these faeces.

Even during active *Toxoplasma* infection in cats, shedding of the *Toxoplasma* eggs in cat's faeces is very sporadic.

Now it may seem very unlikely that you would ingest some of your cat's faeces – however it is not that *uncommon*. For example, if the family dog likes the delicacy of a little bit of cat poo now and then, and that same dog likes to lick your face ... I think you get the picture.

It is far more likely that you will contract (and probably already have) *Toxoplasma* from handling raw meat,

eating rare meat (*Toxoplasma* cysts are present in many types of meat including beef and lamb), and eating unwashed lettuce (wild animals defecate on growing lettuce!). In fact, a lot of people have already had Toxoplasmosis (it feels like the flu) and if you have had it previously, there is no risk you can get it again. However, if you follow these simple guidelines your chances of contracting *Toxoplasma* from your cat is essentially zero (but remember, uncooked and undercooked meats, unwashed vegetables and fruit, and gardening without gloves still present risks).

- Get yourself tested if you have had Toxoplasma before then you can probably relax (take your doctor's advice as immunity may not be complete if the infection was recent)
- Clean all cat faeces twice daily (therefore every 12 hours and any potential *Toxoplasma* in a cat's faeces cannot be infectious to people)
- Wear gloves when cleaning the litter tray
- · Practice good hand hygiene
- Pour boiling water over the litter tray to sterilise it once a week
- Get your partner to do all the cat poo work!

All white cats with blue eyes are deaf. All tortoiseshell cats are female. All ginger cats are male.

These are a group of common myths we hear about cats all the time. White cats with blue eyes are *more likely* to be deaf than your average cat, however, not all blue-eyed, white cats are deaf (and in any case, deaf cats make *great pets* and companions!).





All tortoiseshell cats are female is an interesting one. There have been some unconfirmed reports of male tortoiseshell cats (including one in Australia in recent years) however, these cats are usually hermaphrodites and/or infertile. At this point in time, I think it is fair to say that all tortoiseshell cats are female!

Ginger cats on the other hand ... It was once believed that all ginger cats were male. This one is definitely not true. Ginger females are becoming increasingly more common and they are definitely not sterile.

You should let your female cat have one litter to 'calm them down'

This is a commonly held misconception about female cats: that if they have one litter and then you desex them, they will calm down and make a good pet. There is absolutely no proof to this myth, and in fact, when you consider all the potential complications/ramifications to letting the family pet have one litter, it is definitely wiser to desex your cat before they are of breeding age.

Potential complications/ramifications to letting your cat have a litter include:

- Dystocia (birthing problems) leading to caesarean sections
- Mammary and uterine infections
- Mammary and uterine/ovarian cancers
- Undesexed cats roam and fight leading to spread of disease and injuries
- · There are already enough kittens in the world!

I suspect that this myth came about when people witnessed what cats are like when they are *in* season. Cats in season are a little crazy – they spend all day and night vocalising, roaming, often standing at a window with their rump in the air and generally driving their owners mad in the process. Then, as soon as they are mated, they "calm down". If you desex your cat before they can come into season then they will never become a *little* crazy in the first place!

Indoor cats do not need flea prevention

That indoor cats don't require flea treatment is something we hear time and time again and it simply is not true. In fact, once fleas become established in an apartment, it can be a much worse problem and significantly harder to resolve than if a cat is indoor/outdoor in a house. Recently at the clinic I saw a client who owned two cats and lived on the seventh storey of an apartment building – both cats needed to be hospitalised due to severe flea infestations.

Where do these fleas come from? There are many possibilities but the short answer is on your shoes. You can carry flea eggs, larvae and adult fleas in on your shoes (or your visitors might bring them in on *their* shoes). You might have shared a path with a cat or dog with fleas earlier in the day, or visitors to your home might have a problem with fleas at their home and bring that problem with them!

Fleas cause significant irritation to cats, from simply being itchy and over-grooming, to severe dermatitis that can take months to resolve. Fleas can spread some parasites (such as tapeworm) and a severe blood-borne bacteria known as *Mycoplasma* which can be fatal to cats. Regular monthly flea prevention with a good quality flea control product (eg Advantage, Advocate, Comfortis) is the best way to keep fleas at bay. Products that are stocked in the supermarket are essentially useless for flea control. It is better to spend your money on products that will work from either a veterinarian, pet shop or even better, the Cat Protection Society shop!

Summer reading

Lesley recommends those written by Derrek Tangye. "They are not cat specific, however, many feature the cats he and his wife Jeannie had at their Cornwall home Minack, along with their donkeys and the wild birds and others who were regular visitors. If you only read one, it should be *Somewhere a Cat is Waiting* which is a trilogy featuring the cats they had over the years. They are beautifully written and so lovingly express the feelings of true cat lovers. Some of his books are available in Australia, but this particular one is available through Amazon UK." Lesley tells us that she is now re-reading these after nearly 40 years and that if you haven't already discovered them, you'll love them.

Along with many members and Facebook friends, Diana also recommends the three-part series *Cats Uncovered* that screened on SBS recently. It is now available on DVD and is fascinating, beautifully filmed and informative. Cat carrier covers

Transporting your cat to the vet can be very stressful for them, and covering their carrier so they cannot see outside is very helpful in minimising that stress. Keeping your cat's carrier 'out' so that it isn't seen as a strange object is a good way to get them used to the carrier (many cats happily sleep in them!) and when it is time to take your cat to the vet, spray the inside the carrier with a little Feliway and line it with your cat's favourite blanket.

For infection control reasons, we use a colour-coded range of carrier covers when taking our cats to the vet, but Amalia has created a gorgeous range of pretty covers for sale to our clients. Available in our store for just \$40, sales of the covers will not only make your cat feel calmer when visiting the vet but help other cats in need as well!

Research on early-age desexing

You may have seen or heard Cat Protection in the news in early November. Associate Professor Vanessa Barrs of Sydney University's Faculty of Veterinary Science was the chief investigator of a study into early-age desexing, using Cat Protection's records. The study showed early-age desexing presented no increased risk of complication and contributes to the growing body of evidence that early-age desexing is safe and effective. Waiting until the 'traditional' age of six months is too late as by that time, a cat may already have had her first litter. Additionally, there are many other benefits to early-age desexing including preventing the development of unwanted behaviours that come with sexual maturity, and a reduced risk of cancers of the reproductive system.

Cat Protection paid for this study to be published in the peer-reviewed Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery Open Reports, which is an official journal of the International Society of Feline Medicine. This makes the study freely available to anyone in the world, and we are most proud to have made this contribution to the promotion of early-age desexing. The paper 'Effect of age and surgical approach on perioperative wound complication following ovariohysterectomy in shelter-housed cats in Australia' can be downloaded from our website. Surgical desexing requires the skills and time of a qualified experienced vet. A challenge in many communities around the globe in managing companion animal overpopulation is simply being able to access the services of professional vets. Imagine if there were a non-surgical procedure to sterilise animals in these situations?

There are a number of organisations engaged in this research (mainly in the US). There is even a foundation offering financial support for such research: the **Michelson Prize and Grants Found Animals Foundation**.
